QUEEN CAKE
with toasted walnut filling
1 cup Spry 2 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon salt 2 cups sifted flour
1 cup sugar 1/2 cup milk
4 eggs, unbeaten

Combine brown sugar, salt, butter and water in top of double boiler and heat until sugar is dissolved. Pour over egg yolk, return to double boiler and cook until thickened, stirring constantly. Cool. Add walnuts, spread between layers.

SEA FOAM FROSTING
1 egg white 3 tablespoons water
1/2 cup brown sugar 1 teaspoon light cream
1/2 cup walnuts, chopped and toasted
Combine egg white, brown sugar, water and cream in top of double boiler and beat thoroughly. Place over rapidly boiling water and beat constantly with rotary egg beater until mixture holds up in peaks (about 7 minutes). Remove from fire, add vanilla and beat until cool and thick enough to spread.
