Chamber of Commerce Has Busy Session At Reedsport

REEDSPORT, Feb. 13.—(Special)—The chamber of commerce met recently, at which time the secretary was instructed to write a letter of appreciation and good wishes to Ed J. Miller, who is resigning his position as secretary of the Oregon Coast Highway association to enter business in Eugene. A report of the meeting of the Oregon Coast Highway association held recently in North Bend, was given by Director W. A. Lovelace, who also gave a brief outline of the intended activities of the organization for the coming year. W. A. Burdick, chairman of the Taxpayers' League of Western Douglas county, gave a report of the progress of that group in an effort to equalize tax assessments on western Douglas county properties. A communication, showing that the efforts of the various organizations of the state to aid the broadcasting station at Corvallis in keeping a station in Arizona from being granted the same wave length had been successful, was read.

In reply to the request of the Aero club of Oregon which asks the support of the chamber of commerce in an effort to urge a standard text for mechanics and flying students similar to the present army air corps extension course, the committee on aviation was instructed to pledge its support in the matter.

The chamber of commerce unanimously endorsed the stand of the city council in presenting a resolution approving the proposed legislation providing for distribution to the various cities of the state a portion of the funds received from the state tax on gasoline.

The committee on industries was instructed to acquaint itself with recent federal legislation on the lumber industries and report back to the chamber. In accordance with the request of the Oregon Roadside council, endorsement of the chamber was given concerning a bill to be introduced in the present session of the legislature governing the placing of roadside signs on highway rights-of-way.

AT PORTLAND

OAKRIDGE, Feb. 13.—(Special)—Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Jeffries and son, Tommy, have left for Portland, where they will spend several days while Mrs. Jeffries attends the state convention of beauty shop owners and operators.

This law, however, was declared unconstitutional in the first test before the supreme court.

Opponents of the 25-mile-an-hour speed law claim that it would too greatly slow down traffic and it passed would seriously handicap deliveries and other transportation within the city. To these Chief Bergman would point out the results of a survey conducted in Providence, Rhode Island.

In a test to determine the time lost by slow driving, Superintendent John J. Parker of the Providence police went out with two drivers. One was told to drive as fast as he could, to cut corners, "beat" stop lights, and other things to accelerate his progress. The other driver was instructed to drive well under 25 miles an hour and to observe all safety rules of the road. After driving through the city the two drivers arrived at their destination less than two minutes apart!

That city, with more than ten times the population of Eugene and with a great deal more traffic, was able to reduce the number of non-fatal accidents from 679 to 267 and to cut fatalities to less than half in nine months by establishing and rigorously enforcing a 25-mile-an-hour speed law.

If Providence can cut traffic accidents in that manner, perhaps Eugene and other cities of Oregon with a 25-mile-an-hour maximum speed law and with strict enforcement can eliminate many of the accidents and deaths occurring daily in the streets. At least that is the hope of Chief Bergman and other Oregon police heads who are attempting to get the new law.

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Report On Zoning Is Made For Council

REEDSPORT, Feb. 13.—(Special)—At the meeting of the city council last week W. A. Burdick, representing the proposed Taxpayers' League, reported on the plans of that body and asked the co-operation of the council. According to Mr. Burdick's report, copies of the tax rolls have been made by Frank Norris and John Diehl, and two separate maps are being prepared by H. W. Walker, one of which will show the ownership of every lot within the limits of the city, and the assessed valuation of same, which map will be used in the campaign to equalize the assessed valuations of city property. The other map will show all properties and improvements, with a view to zoning of the town and the drafting of a building code.

When preliminary work has been done by this committee, a member of the state planning commission will come to Reedsport to assist in the final presentation to the city council for the zoning and building ordinance enactments according to Mr. Burdick's report.

The establishment of a lounge and rest room for out-of-town shoppers was requested by a committee composed of Mrs. Wayne Conger, Mrs. Stanley Cochran and Mrs. George Radich, who represented the Parent-Teacher association.

The use of the rooms formerly used by the city library, with heat, lights and part of the furnishings free, was offered by the council, provided a caretaker for the rooms could be provided by the P-T-A. or some other group.

Approval of the application of the city for WPA funds for street and sidewalks in the amount of \$17,000 was reported, said fund being now available.

The request of the fire chief that the old house opposite the undercrossing of the S. P. railway be condemned and torn down on account of the fire hazard, was referred to the city recorder.

An agreement with the West Coast Power company for the furnishing of city and street lights for a term of two years was approved, and the city street department was instructed to repair at once the road past the Standard Oil warehouse and under the S. P. bridge to the port dock.
