Marvin P. Warlick, present manager of the Eugene hospital, virtually put Corley through school when the Eugene politico was business manager of athletics and Tech.

Corley is a self-made man. Warlick says, "a fighting footballer as I remember, a lad who was an inspirational leader and one who battled harder with the more bumps and bruises handed out by the opposition."

Oregon's new coach weighed only around 160 pounds when he played center for Texas Tech—the best roving center ever developed by Coach E. Y. Freeland, according to Warlick.

Freeland was assistant coach to Morrison at S. M. U. and undoubtedly Corley is well versed in the Vanderbilt system of play as Freeland was considered the best tackle in Southern Conference history when he played at Vanderbilt.

Warlick predicts Corley will be a hard worker and will be well liked by Oregon's gridgers.

Bill "Andy Devine" Cole will be on the job until April when he will go back to the land of sunshine, oranges and Santa Ana high school.

Of course you're going to send all of your star football players to Oregon, aren't you, Bill," the writer asked the heavy-weight grid mentor.

And then "Big Bill" went into a song and dance about how difficult it is to interest good football players to come to Oregon or any of the northwest schools—for financial reasons.

George Varoff, Kerm Störl and Lloyd Dod will represent the University of Oregon in three important indoor track and field meets within the next six weeks, opening with the Pacific Coast Indoor Championships in San Francisco Feb. 25.

The trio will also perform in the Golden Gate International exposition at Treasure Island March 4 and the Hill Military classic in Portland March 31.

Varoff is determined to recapture the world indoor record he held up until a little over a week ago when Cornelius Warmerdam of the Olympic club soared 14 feet 6 1/8 inches, one and 2/8 inches over Varoff's record of 14 feet 4 7/8 made at Boston in 1937.

Störl fans will remember as the Webfoots' great middle-distance runner who promises to develop into the best on the coast within the year. He is rated only second to the Trojans' Zamperini at the present time. Kerm, who competed for the coast in the Big Ten dual meet last summer, will enter the 1000-yard run.

Dod is a newcomer to local center fans, a transfer from San Mateo, Cal., junior college. Lloyd, rated a top-notch timber topper, will be entered in the 60-yard high hurdles.

Thanks to basketball, fishing and hunting, Joe Gordon will report to the New York Yankees' training camp at St. Petersburg, Fla., in fine physical condition. The former Oregon baseball star will leave Eugene Thursday. Up until today, Joe hadn't signed his contract and will not be likely to until putting his head together with "Big Boss" Harrow.

Portland tennis fans will have their sports spotlight on New York Thursday when the National Indoor Tennis championships will open. Seeded No. 1 will be Wayne Sabin, Rose City netman who has taken the Florida winter circuit in stride.

Banked far down nationally, the Portlander nevertheless is seeded above Gene Makko, holding a No. 3 national rating. Sidney Wood, New York veteran, is No. 3.

Unless you have tired of basketball, there will be some mighty high class games played at the armory Wednesday night when the county independents will be battling for a place in the state A. A. U. tournament. The teams—Coburg, Odd Fellows and Company "M." You can't go wrong for two bits.

Wagner Awaits Word From Al Szasz

Borican Defeats Kansas Flash

1000-Yard Race Fails To Take Famous Kick

NEW YORK, Feb. 21.—(AP)—Glenn Cunningham, mile specialist, defeated last night at 1,000 yards, said today he would step out of his class again March 4 to meet Don Lash at two miles in the footracing feature of the indoor track season.

Invincible at a mile, Cunningham sought competition at 1,000 yards and found too much of it in Johnny Borican, middle-distance sensation of the Seaton Hall games at Newark. Borican, lanky Elberon, N. J., negro, scored his eighth victory in 10 starts.

The Cunningham-Lash meeting, a special feature of the I. C. 4-A games at Madison Square Garden, threatens to steal some of the spotlight from the National A. A. U. indoor championships at the Garden Saturday night.

The race will send the holders of the world indoor mile and two mile records against each other at a distance favoring Lash.

It is a test that track fans have been talking about for several seasons, but the promoters couldn't get Cunningham to sign for the longer haul. Frequently Lash has cut his specialty in half to try and give Cunningham a race, but so far has been unable to gain a victory.

Glenn holds the world indoor record at 1,000 yards, the distance at which he was outclassed by Borican last night. His flame-scarred legs carried him to a 2:10.1 record in March, 1935.

With no special training for less than a mile, Glenn trailed Borican last night by five yards. The Jersey negro broke the tape in 2:14.3, a record for the flat track of Newark armory.

Lash took a beating in his own two-mile backyard last night, but most observers believed he was experimenting with the last lap kick maneuver that enabled him to win the N. Y. A. C. title last week. Little Tommy Deakard, former University of Indiana running mate of Lash, popped into the lead with a half mile to go and Don's bell-lap sprint was not enough to close the huge gap. Don had a hard run on his hands to keep Joe McCluskey, N. Y. A. C. veteran, out of second place. Deakard's time of 9:15.2 was more than six seconds slower than Lash's time in taking the N. Y. A. C. title.

Novice Trackman Adds Color To Coming AAU Meet

HOLLISTON, Mass., Feb. 21.—(AP)—A bronzed, fair-haired giant plodded up the pathway to an old New England farmhouse today.

The six-footer was Edward "Ted" Taylor, Holliston's one-man track team, who has entered four events in the National A. A. U. championships at New York Feb. 25.

He shifted his weight from one foot to the other, a bit bewildered by the sudden interest in something he had been doing "for about 12 years now."

What did Ted think of his chances in the "blue ribbon" track meet?

"I think I'll do pretty well at it," he said.

Did he think he could beat such stars as Ben Johnson and Herb Thompson in the 60-meter dash?

"I'll finish first or second," the 212-pound woodchopper replied.

Though he didn't know much about fellows like John Horbert, Wesley Wallace and Jim Horbert, he knew he was going to do "all right" in the 600 and 1000-meter runs.

It developed that Taylor who also entered the 16-pound shot put and was considering the 35-pound weight throwing event, never had attempted either.

The 30-year-old novice, who was born at Auburn, N. Y., started running 12 years ago as a Holliston high school freshman but "never had time" to take part in formal competition. His only track work has been confined to the road that passes the Taylor farmhouse. He has no trainer and never has been timed.

Huskies Win Fifth Straight

Idaho Vandals 43-35 Losers To Huskies

MOSCOW, Idaho, Feb. 21.—(AP)—Those hard-driving Washington Huskies had a 43-35 victory over Idaho to their credit today—the fifth straight win in their effort to write a story-book finish in the northern division, Pacific Coast Conference title race.

All they have to do now is beat Idaho again tonight and take the two final games from Oregon at Seattle March 3 and 4 to snatch the title from the Webfoots.

Captain George Ziegenfuss, guard, provided the scoring punch for Washington last night. He led Husky rallies in both periods, to pile up 18 points for individual honors.

The game started slowly, with the lead changing several times, until Washington tied it at 11-11 and then indulged in a scoring sprint led by Zeigenfuss. Bill McDonald and Pat Dorsey take the Huskies a 22-12 halftime lead.

Ziegenfuss put down a Vandal uprising again in the second half. When Idaho started chopping away at the Washington lead, the Husky guard stepped in and caged four baskets in a row. After that the Vandals just hung on.

Illness handicapped the Idaho team. Its star guard, Merle Atkinson, was out of the game with flu, and Center Brendon Barrett had just recovered from the same ailment. However, Barrett accumulated 10 points in less than half a game to lead the Idaho scoring.

Oregon, which has won 11 games and lost two, has another contest with Oregon State Friday before the Washington series. The Huskies now have won ten and lost three.
