

Class Play Set Friday, Saturday

"The Black Flamingo," an historical play dealing with the period of the French revolution, will be presented by the senior class of the Eugene high school at the school auditorium Friday and Saturday, March 24-25, at 8 p. m., it was announced Tuesday.

Despite a recently fractured skull, Frank Loomis, who was cast as Felipe Bodier, the lead of the play, will play the part, it was announced by Mrs. Ethel Chase Christie, director of the play. Loomis was injured in a fall from a bicycle recently and was in the hospital for some time.

Tom Warlick is cast in the part of the inn keeper at the "Black Flamingo" which was located on a road near Paris and to which came aristocrats, petty thieves and others after the revolution.

The action of the play occurs on the day after the fall of the Bastille.

A miniature set, representing the scene of the play, has been made by the stage crew and is on display in a window at Washburne's, it was announced.

Furniture and other "props" for the play have been made by students in keeping with the period of the play.
