Inspired by their individual victories in Portland Monday night, Bulldog Jackson and Tony Garibaldi were taking all of the available money they could find at the prevailing odds on their scheduled team match against Otis Clingman and Jackie Nichols at the armory Thursday night.

Because Clingman and Filipo Romano handed the two villains an unmerciful beating in a tandem tussle several weeks ago, local betting commissioners have established the cleanies as 5 to 2 favorites. The flood of Jackson-Garibaldi money, however, had cut the odds to 4-3 at noon Thursday.

Eye McShain Match
Jackson defeated "Rebel" Riley and Garibaldi took the measure of Zibby Zbyszko in Portland matches Monday.

"We'd be suckers not to take anything even-money or better on Thursday's match," Jackson said. "I was certainly not myself when we lost our last team match and Nichols isn't that much better than Romano."

There will be more than the wagers, the honor of winning and rivalry between cleanies and meanies involved in Thursday's match. To the grappler who makes the best showing within the next few weeks will go a world championship light-heavyweight match against Danny McShain.

Although the champion usually demands 60 percent of the purse, getting a crack at the world championship not only gives the challenger an opportunity to light the crown, but to get a slice of a good purse. Jack Reynolds, welterweight titleholder, was the last champion to appear here. He packed the armory in a match against Ben Sherman three years ago.

Except for the top and bottom clubs, it was all square in the Pacific Coast baseball league today, with six middle teams tied at .500 per cent and the Los Angeles Angels stepping out ahead of the pack with ten straight victories behind them.

While the cellar-spot Sacramento Senators won their second game of the season by nipping Hollywood again, 9 to 7, Los Angeles got hits when they counted and defeated Portland 9-5, at Los Angeles.

Angels Beaten Twice
The Los Angeles club, beaten only twice this year, sewed up the ball game in the sixth when Pitcher Lee Stine smashed a homer with two on, sending Bill Radonits from the Portland mound. The Angels hit Radonits and Ralph Birkofer for 12 hits, while Stine gave up 11.

At Sacramento Wednesday night, the Senators drove Rugger Ardizola from the hill with a six-run spurge in the second inning as they beat Hollywood.

Third-baseman Mickey Hastin connected for a single with the bases loaded in the 10th inning to score Al Niemiec and give the San Diego Padres a 7-to-6 win over the San Francisco club at San Diego. San Diego sluggers blasted the offerings of Aldon Wilkie and Win Ballou for 17 hits. Fred Berger, acquired by the Padres from St. Paul, hit a 400-foot homer in the eighth. There was no one on base.

Isekite Sent to Tacoma
Oakland scored three runs in the opening frame off Southpaw Bill Walker and never relinquished the lead in beating Seattle at Oakland Wednesday night 9-4. Clarence Pickrel relieved Walker in the second, and Ed Selway replaced Pickrel in the fifth. Jack Salvesson pitched the full route for Oakland, giving up 14 hits.
