

Junior Club Planned By Upper Willamette

DEXTER, April 13.—(Special)—More than 50 members attended

the regular monthly meeting of the Upper Willamette Rod and Gun club, held in Lewis hall, here last Tuesday night.

The organization planned a new sports group to function in this area, namely, a Junior Upper Willamette Rod and Gun club. This club will be open to members up

to 18 years of age, and was founded for the purpose of early instruction and training for the youngsters interested in the conservation, perpetuation, and betterment of fishing, hunting, and wild life conditions in general throughout the county and state. Plans were made for the dis-

tribution of one thousand pheasant eggs which have been promised by the State Game Commission. These eggs are distributed out to the farmers and friends throughout this area, and are hatched out by the use of the setting hens, or in a few instances, more modern methods of incubation.

This plan was followed last season with considerable success, for it is a general consensus of opinion that there were more birds and better hunting in this area last season, than has been noted here for several seasons in the past.

The next meeting will be held at Westfir on May 9.
