

Partial Eclipse Scheduled to be Visible Here on April 19

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The blighting out of the sun in the daytime and the appearance of dragons, yet even the modern people such as often inspire a distinct feeling of awe.

On the morning of April 19, the sun will be partially eclipsed in all parts of North America with the exception of the extreme northern and southern parts of Florida and the southern part of Mexico.

The phenomenon is listed in the almanac as an annular eclipse. It does not come from the sun, but from "annulus," the word for ring. On April 19, the moon is a trifle too far from the earth entirely to cover the sun. In parts of Alaska the sun will appear as a very narrow strip over all but a narrow strip of the sun's rim. The eclipses of the moon—begin and end at the same time and show the same percentage of totality for all localities—require data for individual places. Thus the eclipse of April 19 will start over four hours later in New York City than it will in one-fourth of the way from the sun's face at Port of Spain.

In Eugene, the eclipse will begin at 4:47 a. m. P. S. T. and end at 6:01 a. m. At the time of

maximum, 7:51 a. m., 69 per cent of the sun's diameter will be darkened.

The best way to observe the eclipse is to use smoked glass or developed photographic film. These may be used either without optical aid or attached over the front lenses of field glasses.

Photographs of the eclipse will be very interesting. Let the camera stand unmoved during the two hours. Every 10 or 15 minutes take a picture. You will thus on one film get a series of sun images showing the progress of the eclipse. The smallest stop and exposure possible should be used. A filter to cut down the light even more will give better images when the sun is brightest. The images will be small, but considerable enlargement will give very satisfactory pictures.

American Fleet To Go On Parade Soon

WASHINGTON, April 13.—(P)—The navy announced today the main body of the fleet would parade before Secretary Swanson April 27 off the Virginia capes, in the first such review in the Atlantic in five years.

About 70 war craft, leaving the Hampton Roads-Yorktown area for the New York world's fair, will steam past the naval secretary and other cabinet members in a column more than 16 miles long.

Swanson will represent President Roosevelt, who saw the fleet in action during the Caribbean war games in February. The chief

executive witnessed the last previous formal review on the east coast, at New York in 1934.

Members of senate and house naval committees and foreign naval attaches will be invited, officials said, to view the display of American sea power.

Leading the column will be the battleship Pennsylvania, flagship of Admiral Claude C. Bloch, commander-in-chief of the fleet.

Seven other battleships, 4 aircraft carriers, 11 light cruisers, 5 heavy cruisers, 36 destroyers, and lesser vessels will follow.

Hoover Meets Noted Pianist; Recalls Embarrassing Incident

PALO ALTO, Cal., April 13.—(P)—Former President Herbert Hoover and Ignace Jan Paderewski, the pianist, who first met 45 years ago under circumstances that were embarrassing for Hoover, renewed their friendship here yesterday.

The incident that first brought them together happened in the spring of 1894, when Hoover was a 19-year-old junior student at Stanford, and Paderewski, then 33, was on one of his early concert tours of America.

Hoover and several other students arranged a concert for Paderewski. The young impresarios, however, failed to realize the date they selected fell during Easter week. Most of the students and faculty members were away, and as a result, few tickets were sold and little money collected.

Hoover and his fellows visited the pianist and embarrassedly explained they could not pay the guarantee of \$800. However, they offered him \$300 and their personal notes for the rest.

Paderewski agreed to take what was left after expenses, and told the students to forget about the rest.

Insurance Officials Plan Year's Work

Nickerson also censured Baker's group for supporting the anti-picketing bill passed at the November election.

Forest Service Fights Moving Sand Dunes

In a dramatic fight against the shifting sand dunes in the vicinity of Siltcoos and Sutton lakes, the forestry service is planting 25,000 Scotch pines and Austrian pines. Dahl J. Kirkpatrick, supervisor, announced Wednesday.

The sand dunes had previously been planted with Holland grass, hard and wiry to withstand the assault of the elements. This is one of the few grasses that will grow at all in sand, Mr. Kirkpatrick said, but even so it is only a temporary expedient against powerful natural forces.

With the encroachment of the dunes temporarily halted by the grass, the pine seedlings have a fifty-fifty chance of becoming permanently rooted, the forest man said. Nursery stock, about eight inches high, is being used, he added.
