

Spreading Rust Endangers Pines

SPOKANE, Wash., April 21.—(P)—Blister rust—scourge of the western white pine forests—is spreading because insufficient money has been provided for its control, the report on the disease revealed here today.

The report, released by the Spokane office of the bureau of entomology and plant quarantine of the department of agriculture, which in cooperation with the U. S. forest service is cooperating in directing and supervising control work, said the rust was spreading faster than protection forces could follow.

Infected Area Unworked
In the three states of Washington, north Idaho and western Montana, covered by the office here, 683,000 acres of white pine forest, or approximately one-third of the infected area has yet to be given even a preliminary working, the report said. A total of 2,600,000 acres was estimated in the infected area.

Disease Jumps
Control of the disease is obtained through destroying the host plants—wild currant and gooseberry bushes—since the rust lives by jumping from the bushes to the pines and back, but not from pine to pine.

Since control work started in 1923, the report shows that "first working" has covered 1,782,000 acres. And that "second workings" to pick up new sprouts or bushes missed have covered only 202,000 acres.

During 1928, 4,708 men were employed on control work, covering a total of 19,000 acres, of which only 77,000 was forest working.

Since the rust was discovered in the northwest it has spread into the white pine forest of Oregon and the sugar pines of California, states not covered in the Spokane office report.

THE perfect spring day luncheon dish for sturdy appetites—large stuffed potatoes with egg and canned or new peas.

When beans jump into the salad bowl men will come to watch the sport. Good French dressing tames kidney and navy and lima beans to salad gentleness, and fresh spring salad greens will complete the conversion. Result: all the gaiety of a salad plus the protein virtue of dried beans.

Kidney Bean Salad

(Serves 4 to 6)
Two and one-half cups cooked kidney beans (canned or dried), 2 hard-cooked eggs diced, 1-2 cup diced celery, 1 tablespoon minced chives, 1 cup diced green pepper, 1-4 cup chopped sweet pickle, salt and pepper, French dressing, mayonnaise.

Combine all ingredients. Season to taste. Marinate in French dressing. Chill thoroughly and serve on crisp lettuce. Pass mayonnaise in separate bowl.

Navy Bean Salad

(Serves 4 to 6)
Two cups cooked navy beans (canned or dried), 1 cup bean sprouts, 1 cup minced pimiento, 1-4 cup chopped green pepper, 2 tablespoons lemon juice, 1 teaspoon minced onion, 1-4 cup diced celery, salt and pepper to taste, French dressing, Russian dressing.

Combine all ingredients and season to taste. Marinate in French dressing. Chill thoroughly and serve on bed of salad greens. Pass Russian dressing in separate bowl.

Lima Bean Salad

(Serves 4 to 6)
One cup cooked dried lima beans, 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce, 2 tablespoons minced onion, 2 tablespoons finely minced parsley, 1 teaspoon minced tarragon, 1-4 cup French dressing. Combine all ingredients. Chill. Serve from chilled bowl lined with crisp young lettuce.

Recipes of the Week

MRS. R. P. DICK'S CARROT FLOWER SALAD
1 package of lime Jello.
1/4 cup of lemon juice.
3/4 cup of pineapple juice.
1 cup of boiling water.
1 or 2 large carrots.

Dissolve Jello in the boiling water. When cool, add lime and pineapple juice.

Before Jello thickens, get the carrot flowers made. Carrots are made in the following manner: Take a large carrot, wash and scrape. Cut paper-thin cross sections, and notch between the sections. Use five or six small plain molds (cups of the kind used for making jelly). Place carrot flowers on bottom and sides of mold if preferred. Place carrot flowers on bottom and sides of mold so that they just touch. Spoon partly thickened Jello into mold, holding flowers in place as you do so. Allow the Jello to harden thoroughly.

This salad is most effective served on crystal plates, with lettuce. Mayonnaise or other dressing should be passed separately.
