YES, MY DARLING DAUGHTER, McDonald; Hollywood, by adding two "key" lines to the play, originally a bit sensational, pushed it past the censors, has had it shown in all but one or two states and has preserved the thing's original appeal. At "crucial" times the mentioned lines are inserted to allay the fears of the most, shall we call it old-fashioned, movie fan. Que of them, when the male member of the "week-enders" asks for two cabins at the auto camp, is the first pointed hint that all will be well in spite of the original plan. Another, later in the show, is when the girl in question admits to her mother that all was well. But the Eugene "Yes, My Darling Daughter," if Life magazine shall be taken as a reference, does not have all the original scenes. "Daughter," you may remember, showed at the fairgrounds at the Very Little Theatre last winter. To those who have seen the play, the show is a bit uninteresting because in so many parts the lines have been left intact. But if they would have tampered with them, no doubt, the California version might have not been the appealing, highly entertaining little story it is. It is a comedy which will keep you gripping the red upholstery with admiration for straight-shooting youths.
