Sour Cherry Bud Blight Studied

A meeting of growers interested will be held at the farm of Wendell Bartholomew in the lower Santa Clara district Friday at 1:30 p. m., to discuss "bud blight" on sour cherry trees, it was announced Tuesday by O. S. Fletcher, county agent. Dr. S. M. Zeller, plant pathologist, and O. T. McWhorter, extension horticulturist at the State college, will be present.

This blight, or whatever it is, began to appear only a few years ago, affecting the buds of sour cherry trees in the early spring. Experts have become satisfied that it is not a plant disease problem and are now trying to determine means of checking the blight.

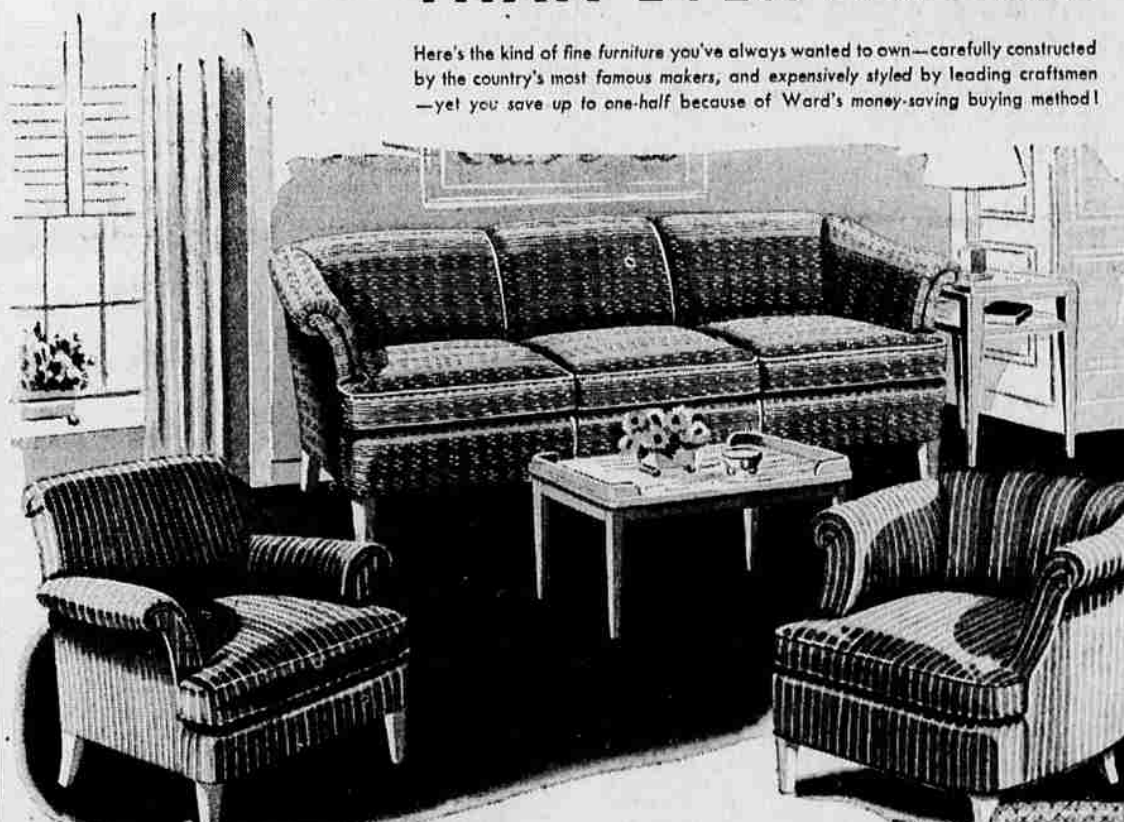
