New Unit Will House 2 Classrooms

BLUE RIVER, June 13.—(Special)—At a special election held in Blue River it was decided to issue warrants to finance the new wing to be built on the Blue River school. The new building is to house two classrooms, each room to hold the capacity of 35 pupils. Dimensions of both rooms are 28½ feet by 23 feet, with a stage addition of 7 feet by 23 feet. Graham B. Smith of Eugene is the architect.
