Have Mildew—County Judge Clinton Hurd, who has been in the hop growing business on his farm near Coburg for many years, says the recent rains have caused downy mildew to appear on two or three days of year. With two or three days of rain it will develop rapidly. He showed a number of branches of vines thus affected at his office Wednesday. If the mildew attacks all yards in the valley the price will be higher, he predicted. This occurred three years ago.
