The Pittsburgh smoke-eater didn't have a chance to turn his hook-and-ladder car to turn his hook out on the all-star field at Yankee stadium Tuesday, as he did in Cincinnati last year, but he made up for it Wednesday night as the Pirates knocked off the Brooklyn Dodgers with a 3-0 coast of whitewashing before a crowd of 29,481 in the only game on the major league program.

Fireman Brown's latest job of answering the alarm was to put the chill on Whitey Wyatt, who has been just about the hottest newcomer to come down the National league pike.

Wyatt had won eight straight and hadn't been beaten. So it was time to turn in the alarm to cool him off. And the fireman, who you may recall, was famous for that sort of thing in 51 games, or about one-third of the entire schedule, last year, came a-runnin'. He started the game last night, gave up six hits, ran into trouble only twice, and when he did he ran right out of it again.

Fighting Fox Talk Of Turf World Following Massachusetts Victory

BOSTON, July 13.—(AP)—They said Fighting Fox had a distinct distaste for distance, but the Belair stud colt's driving finish to win the \$50,000 Massachusetts handicap was the talk of the turf world today.

But the unpredictable colt, a 15-1 shot, amazed the crowd of 40,000 with his run through the mud in 1:52—just three seconds off Seabiscuit's track record.

There'll be bad blood at the armory Thursday night. With the blue chips stacked in the middle of the ring, "Wild Red" Berry, former world light-heavyweight champion, and Marshall Carter, one of the nation's leading grapplers, will meet for the right to a coast title match with Champion Eddie Roberts.

It will be their third meeting and the third time will be the charm—and possible riches—to the winner.

All Lane county is expected—the hired men will have to do the milking and the dinner dishes will be stacked in the sink while "mother" attends the three-star mat show. Promoter Herb Owen has invited all Lane county women to be his guests—ringside seats excepted.

Roberts to Risk Neck
The coast champion will also appear on the card. Although Roberts will not be risking his title, local railbirds fear he will take a chance of coming out of his semi-final match with George Kitzmiller physically unable to defend his championship against the main-event winner next Thursday.

The 200-pound Seattle villain caused Carter no end of trouble in the local ring two weeks ago, despite his defeat. Roberts, incidentally, requested a postponement of his title defense this week because of a rash on his forehead suffered in a match with Don Hill last week.

Hill, who showed great improvement over his initial appearance several weeks ago, will meet Jack Kaiser, popular St. Johns middleweight. Both boys are light, speedy, scientific matmen and their match should be in sharp contrast to the knock-down, drag-out feature matches. "Thirty minutes of fine wrestling," Owen predicted.

Each Hold Victory
While both previous meetings between Berry and Carter have been bitter struggles, Thursday's battle looms as the most potent thing seen in the local ring for months.

Berry won the first match when Carter hurtled into the ring rope, hitting his Adam's apple. He was unable to return to continue the match and lost a technical decision. Last week, after each had landed a fall, Carter landed a KO haymaker on Berry's chin while Referee Elton Owen was allegedly holding the red-haired man.

Owen, at the "request" of Berry, will not officiate Thursday. If Harry Elliott is unable to arrive from Portland in time Freddie Hale will referee.

Reserved seat tickets are on sale at the Club Cigar store. The opening match is scheduled to start at 8:30 p. m.

Conn 3-1 Favorite To Trim Bettina

NEW YORK, July 13.—(AP)—Billy Conn of Pittsburgh and Melio Bettina of Beacon, N. Y., two tough youngsters who fully expect to be plunk in the middle of the heavyweight situation a year from now, clash in a 15-rounder at Madison Square Garden tonight for this country's 173-pound title. The fight will be broadcast over KEX, Portland, starting at 8:30 p. m.

Bettina already has been recognized as light-heavyweight champion by the New York state athletic commission, and the winner of tonight's tussle will get an official nod from the National Boxing association, making it unanimous.

Conn, reigning favorite of New York fans since his left hook blasted out two victories over Fred Apostoli and another of Solly Krieger, has been made a firm choice in the betting, with Bettina's admirers receiving 3 to 1 for their money.
