It's getting mighty close to the slack season in trout fishing, but good catches continue to be reported from Lane county's major streams—the McKenzie and Willamette and tributaries.

August has always been considered the "Blue Monday" month for angling and should be even more so this year because of the fine condition of the water during the earlier part of the season. Continued cool weather, however, may keep fishing good far into the month.

April or August, Dr. Izzy Ichthyic still thinks he can tell anglers, if not how, to catch the wiley trout. His weekly time table appearing in this column has become a bible to the more successful fishermen. He hereby presents this week's prognostications:

Meyer and Earl Byrom and Tad Luckey have been having fun catching Jack-salmon on flies—just about as fast as they can represent the fly to Mr. Fish. He reports that trout flies are doing the business.

But we understand that for big fish, the thing to use is a Royal Coachman in the cool of the evening. We tried one of Bill Martin's homemade bucktails the other evening and had splendid luck. The things are about as big as a house but do the business.

Just to prove that bass fishing is good in the coast lakes, H. H. Whitney, local angler, had a 6 1/2-pound bass on display in Lightning's window Thursday. The fish, caught in Silcoos lake, was landed on a 5 1/2-ounce fly rod. The coast lakes are also producing fair catches of trout—Tahkenitch, Munsel and Mercer.

The Cascade lakes have been so-so. No favorable reports have been received from Clear Lake. Diamond Lake is still good, despite Herb Cox's unfavorable report. Davis Lake has been an in-and-out.

Red O'Connell Goes To Detroit

Hillbillies Third In Silverton Classic

"Big Red" O'Connell had a jittery night at shortstop for the 'Billies, but the "Big Red" had a right to be jittery. Just before the game he scribbled his name on a Detroit Tiger contract, and in a few days he'll be off to join the Tigers' Beaumont farm club in the Texas league, where Bob Hardy is now pitching.

Elmer Mallory, the Junction City lad destined to follow in the footsteps of Oregon's Joe Gordon, returned home this week from Payette, Idaho, where he is playing summer baseball with the Payette Reds. Elmer, who held down the short stop position for Howard Hobson's 1937 northern division pennant winners, returned to Payette Friday to prepare for a series with the Montana semi-pro champions for the right to enter the national tournament in Wichita, August 11-23.

Referee Elton Owen, who did a superb job as referee, took a terrific lacing in both supporting bouts. Small and Dean had little respect for the official, target for their anger and fists.
