

Reedsport, Gardiner, Smith River Schools To Open New Year Soon

Offs Listed for Various Districts

REEDSPORT, Aug. 21.—(Special)—All schools of this district will open September 5. Superintendent Lienkaemper, principal of Reedsport high school, asks that pupils register previous to that date. Freshmen and sophomores may register on Wednesday, August 20, between the hours of 12 a. m. and 1:30 and 4:30 p. m. according to Mr. Lienkaemper. Juniors and seniors on August 31, during the regular school year. The registration of the subjects to be taught are announced. Helen Carlson will teach English, and coach the volleyball ball teams. Mrs. Davis, a new member of the faculty this year, replacing Mrs. Ward, will instruct in physical education and coach basketball and football. The principal, Mr. Lienkaemper, will teach the health subject. Miss Georgia Phillips will again teach some economics, girls' physiology and English. Miss Wessela, a graduate of the high school and of Oregon State college, will handle the manual training department. Mathematics, Mr. Wessela will teach last year at Drain. Miss Ruby Wright will teach social science and drama, replacing Mrs. Lulu Gordon.

At Gardiner School

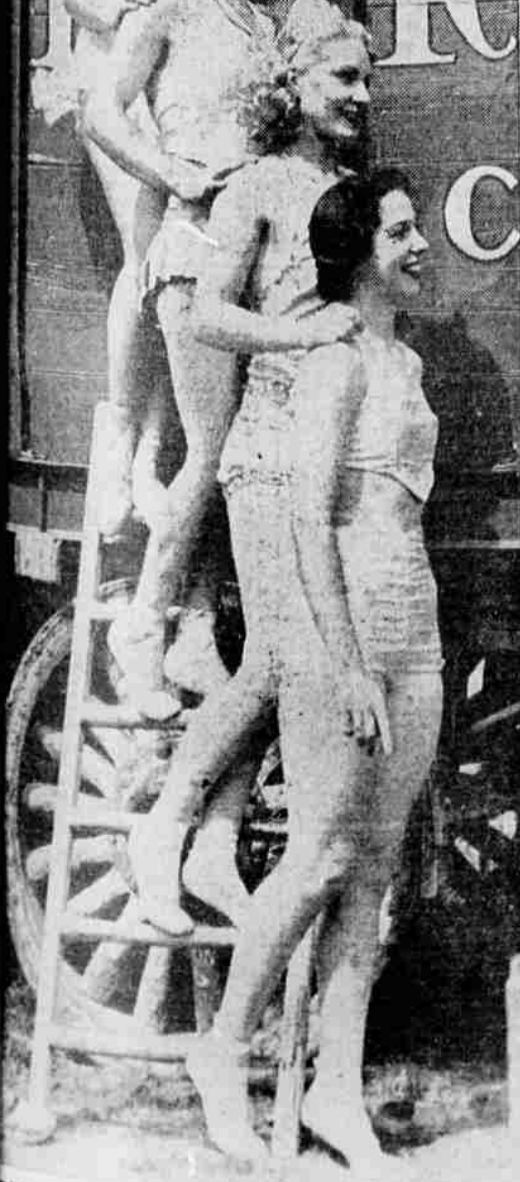

Junction Farmers Want Fire District

The farmers in a district surrounding Junction City for several miles will hold an election September 25 on the proposition of forming a fire protective association. The Lane county court Monday granted the petition signed by some 300 persons, asking for such an election. If the plan carries at the election, the district is empowered to levy a tax, not to exceed two mills, upon all the property within the district for the purpose of buying and maintaining fire fighting equipment, which would be available for use at any time in case of fire. The district will be known as the Junction City Rural Fire Protection district and if the plan carries at the election will be the first one in Lane county and one of the first in the state under a law passed at the last session of the state legislature. A delegation from the proposed district appeared before the court Monday to urge the granting of the petition. I. M. Peterson appeared as attorney for the petitioners.

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Hearing Held on Zoning Ordinance By Reedsport Group

REEDSPORT, Aug. 21.—(Special)—A hearing by the Reedsport planning commission upon a proposed zoning ordinance of the city of Reedsport was held Friday evening before a large crowd of interested property owners. After the ordinance was fully explained and questions answered by the planning commission as to its operation and effect there were some objections to the ordinance as a whole. Some suggestions were made with a view to mitigating the severity of some of the provisions of the ordinance and these were taken into consideration by the commission. A copy of the ordinance was forwarded to the planning consultant of the federal housing commission at Los Angeles for criticism as one of the reasons for adoption of the ordinance is to assist in securing F.H.A. loans in the community. A copy of the ordinance has also been forwarded to Fred A. Cuthbert, landscape architect and consultant of the League of Oregon Cities. The planning commission will, within the next few weeks, make its final report to the city council, after which another hearing will be held by the council before the ordinance is put upon its passage.

Lane Asked to Join In Land Conference

Lane county has been invited to send representatives to a conference to be held soon to discuss a bill in congress which would provide for an appropriation of a sum of money to pay to counties where government owned land is located in lieu of taxes. This would be a different setup from the present method of reimbursing the O and C land grant counties. The money is now derived from the sale of these lands. County Judge Clinton Hurd has received a letter from John L. Childs, secretary-manager of the Western taxpayers' association, with headquarters at Crescent City, Cal., calling attention to the conference and asking Lane county to send delegates. The date or place have not yet been decided upon. Mr. Childs estimates that if the government will pay 10 cents an acre each year on lands it owns, Lane county's share would be approximately \$141,632 a year. This is much more than is received from the O and C land sales.

The large dairy barn on the Earl McNutt ranch, about ten miles north of Lorane burned earlier. The barn had just been filled with about 300 tons of hay. No stock was in the barn at the time of the fire but the milking machine was burned. A large barn in the same location was burned three years ago.
