

Nazis See Britons As Warmongers

(yesterday) afternoon, Chamberlain not only before the lower house (commons), but before the entire world, rejected Germany's hand of peace and thereby gave an answer to the appeal which the fuhrer made in his speech Oct. 6 when he said:

"May those peoples and their leaders now speak up who are of a similar mind and may those reject my hand who believe they must see war as a better solution."

Decision Is War

"Chamberlain and his followers have decided in favor of the latter."

"After this speech by the English prime minister, there can no longer exist any doubt among the German people that no matter what we do, what we say, what we offer, Chamberlain and the war inciters of Great Britain are determined—at the same time that they utter hypocritical phrases—to annihilate the German people."

"Chamberlain's speech reveals the real meaning of England's war aims and this means is: War against the German people, war against the German reich unto annihilation. The speech of the English premier is built upon lies and climaxed in a lie."

"And while charging German policy with breaking Germany's word, he forgets that the world knows that England's world empire is built solely on force and lie. England wanted the war. To be sure, the English prime minister rejected all attempts in recent times to bring about peace."

"Although he knows better, he claims that, for instance, Germany declined Mussolini's offer of mediation. It is certain that after France accepted it, it was England which brought Mussolini's broad-minded action of mediation to a fall and thereby incited the French people into the most senseless war of all times."

"After Chamberlain's speech, the German people knows what its enemies want. From the experience of Versailles, the German people knows what England's will to annihilation can do and it therefore knows the path it must tread to foil this will of its enemies."

Among those are Dorothy Wiberg Linn and Margaret Hegberg who will head the cosmetic department; Fanny Ross, Dorothy Donovan, Loretta Harper, and Helena Perkins. Estelle Kitchen, former buyer of lingerie and foundation garments for Meier & Frank's, will have charge of this department in Russell's. Others of the personnel will be Norwald Nelson, Julian Stalsberg, Kathleen Balfour, Vivian Runtz, Florence E. Scott, Gleneva Harms, Julia Sullivan, Wyeth Williams, Robert Rudolph, and Mildred Kelsio.

In the rear of the Russell store will be the Sperry and Hutchinson green stamp redemption station, headed by Mrs. Scott. W. J. O'Connor, a New York executive of Sperry and Hutchinson has come to Eugene to be present for the opening. Russell's, he stated, was one of the most complete and modern stores for its size he has ever seen. It was, he said, unique in its completeness and convenience, and would be a source of pleasure to Eugene customers.

"Eugene's Own Store" is now located on the ground floor of the building occupied, with the probability of expansion later. Here the newest and best quality of

merchandise can be found, conveniently arranged in attractive glass case displays. The store is light, roomy and artistically arranged.

Its owner, Mr. Russell, is a graduate of the University of Oregon. In his youthful days he worked at a number of department stores during the summer, and after graduation was employed by Washburn's. For the past five years, until that store sold out, he was assistant manager.

Green Stamp Firm In Russell Store

One of the conveniences Eugene customers will find at Russell's new store which opens Friday morning at 10 o'clock, will be the Sperry and Hutchinson green stamp redemption department, located at the rear of the store.

Manager of the department will be Florence E. Scott. All the best lines of articles will be offered for the green stamps. Present for the opening will be a Sperry and Hutchinson New York executive, W. J. O'Connor.

"Sperry and Hutchinson has a long, respectable career behind it," said Mr. O'Connor. It is now in its 44th year and has redemption stations located in every state in the union. Holders of green stamps in one state can have them redeemed in another, and they never expire. The Eugene station, when located at Washburn's once redeemed a book of stamps 25 years old. The station was located in Washburn's 11 years.

Sperry and Hutchinson was originated by two young men who conceived the idea of a co-operative trading stamp company. Mr. Sperry was a shoe store owner and Mr. Hutchinson, a close friend, was a hardware salesman. Since the beginning of the company, it has never ceased business.

Morse, extension dairy specialist at the State college.

Ernest Funk of Florence, one of the directors, has resigned as vice president, and his place is being taken by Mr. Waite while H. J. Merz of Ada was appointed director.

There are at present 25 herds represented in the association and 675 cows are being tested regularly.

Quality Market Under New Management

Bohemia District Subject Of Talks

The Bohemia country is not only a valuable mining district, but is one of Lane county's most beautiful scenic spots and could easily become an attraction for tourists, it was revealed at the meeting of the chamber of commerce Friday noon.

George S. Barton, chairman of the Lane county mining council and chairman of the chamber's mining committee, discussed the trip taken recently by a group of 12 or 15 Eugene men and about 10 members of the Cottage Grove chamber into this area last Wednesday. Plans are now under way to install a 100-ton plant early next spring, Mr. Barton said. This will give the small mine owners a market for their ore. In the Bohemia district is one of the best vein structures for permanency that can be found anywhere in the world, with deposits of gold, lead, zinc, copper and silver.

A cooperative venture by a group of Eugene business men who would develop the Bohemia mines before outside interests take control was urged by Edward W. Miller. Such a program would not be a wildcat scheme, but a sound business investment, but a quality and amount of the mineral resources have been established.

The Bohemia country is a great asset to Lane county, not only because of the beauty of the scenery. Because it is only a short distance from Eugene—35 miles brings one into the heart of the district—it could be publicized as the ideal trip for people who do not have time to take longer trips.

Superphosphates Are Here For Farmers

One of the two cars of superphosphates recently ordered for Lane county farmers from the agricultural conservation administration has arrived at Junction City and the second car for Eugene and vicinity will arrive in a few days. The superphosphates are for farmers receiving federal grants and are paid for by deducting from their payments.

The Junction City car contained 84,600 pounds and was for 47 farmers of the Junction City area and in the Lake Creek valley. The Eugene car will contain 70,000 pounds for 63 farmers.

2 Men Are Caught Stealing Turkeys

Caught in the act of stealing turkeys on Theo Schaff's farm on Upper Camp Creek at 10 o'clock Thursday night, Bruce Grieve, 33, and Vernon McQuaid, 24, both of Eugene, were in the county jail Friday under \$500 bail each on a felony charge. They waived preliminary examination in the justice court.

State Police Officer Gil Holderman on his regular rounds on the Camp creek road passed the car in which the two men had driven from Eugene to the Schaff farm. Becoming suspicious, he drove a quarter of a mile further on and walked back. As he approached the car he heard a stampede of turkeys and soon Grieve and McQuaid appeared with a sack containing four of the birds, he said. The officer said the men literally walked into his arms.

Mr. Schaff told the officers that he had missed about 60 of his turkeys in the past few weeks.

Francis Welsh Held For Iowa Killing

Francis P. Welsh, 28, wanted on charges of first degree murder for the slaying of Harold J. Preher of Mason City, Ia., at Des Moines, Ia., last July, has been arrested in San Francisco, according to word received by Sheriff C. A. Swarts.

Welsh was being sought in Eugene and vicinity at the time of the arrest of Fred Osterreider, Dreher of Mason City, Ia., at Des Moines to face the same charge. A third man, William E. Cooper, 22, is under sentence for robbery in Arizona state prison. He is the man referred to as "Slim" in Osterreider's confession made while he was in the Lane county jail.

Estelle Kitchen With Russell Store
