Horton at Florence—C. A. Horton, accountant, went to Florence Wednesday afternoon to audit the city's books.

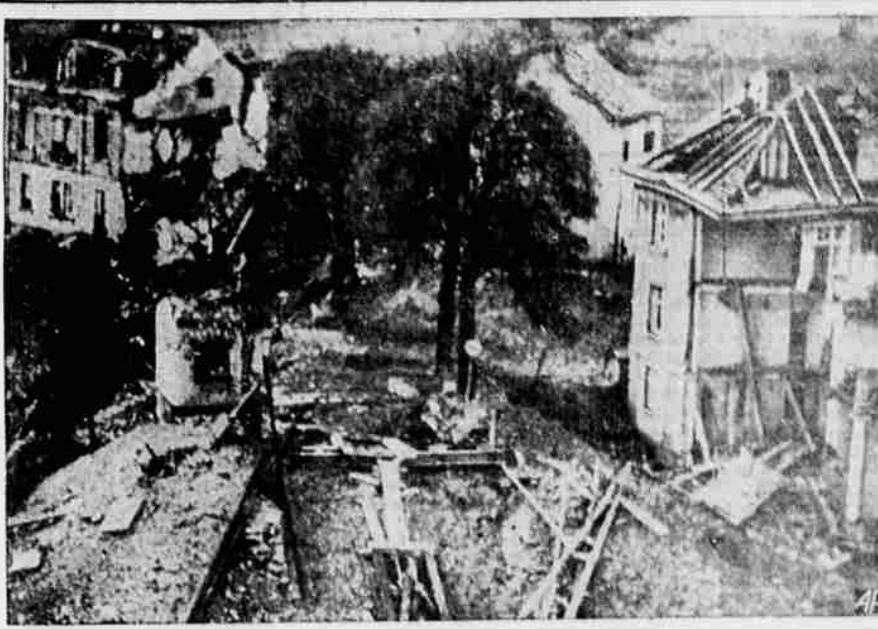
Here From Walton—Mr. and Mrs. Joe Fowler, well-known residents of Walton, were here on a shopping tour Wednesday.

U. S. Gives Cuba Break On Tariffs

WASHINGTON, Dec. 21.—(AP)—The United States has restored tariff reductions on sugar and tobacco imported from Cuba in exchange for Cuban concessions on American exports.

The changes were effected in an agreement signed late yesterday by Secretary Hull and Cuban Ambassador Martinez Frago. It supplements the trade pact between the two countries signed Aug. 24, 1934.

The sugar trade agreement duty of 90 cents a 100 pounds will become effective if the quotas of the sugar act are restored. President Roosevelt appended the quotas when the price of sugar rose sharply after the outbreak of war

in Europe. Thereupon, Cuban sugar, which had been paying 99 cents a 100 pounds, had to pay \$1.50 a hundred.

The concessions on Cuban cigars and cigar tobacco are those contained in the 1934 agreement, but which terminated in 1935.

Cuba granted the United States tariff reductions on peanut butter, canned salmon, and mohair fabrics mixed with hessian or rayon.
