WASHINGTON LETTER

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 6.—In the "thinking" stage is a plan to abolish the state public utilities commissioner in Oregon in order that Paul J. Raver, administrator of Bonneville, can dictate resale rates of Bonneville power.

Government ownership advocates are not satisfied with the state of Oregon rather than the federal government (through an agency) fixing the schedule of rates which customers of utilities must pay. Argument: If the Interstate Commerce Commission, a federal agency, can fix rates for railroads, it is just as proper and logical for a specific federal agency to designate rates for electric energy.

Drastic as the idea may appear, it is already being started in Kentucky where, at the present session of the general assembly, a measure is proposed to repeal the laws creating a public service commission. The charge is made that this movement in Kentucky is inspired by officials, engineers and attorneys of TVA.

The Oregon situation has been attracting attention in the national capital because of the PUD elections, with emphasis on the rejection of a PUD in Lane county and the allegations that men on Bonneville payroll insist on the administrator fixing resale rates—even to the municipally owned plant at Eugene. Ardent advocates of TVA are grumbling that Bonneville is trying to cut under the TVA rates and that this shouldn't be done, for TVA is supposed to be the "yardstick" for the nation. These advocates also hint that the officials of Bonneville are attempting to attract industries to the Columbia river region with cheap power which might otherwise nestle down in the TVA plant.

This is the same squawk that was made by congressmen when they learned TVA was attempting to take industries (and payrolls) from their own districts and they denounced the practice.

A scout for this column has just returned from the deep south with this report: Among democrats there is resentment against the new deal for several reasons, one being they think Mr. Roosevelt has been listening to too many "fellow travelers" and, other, too much attention given colored people by Lady Eleanor. Republicans like Senator Tate because his father once lived at Athens; they regard Dewey as inexperienced. When Oregon's McNary was mentioned as a dark horse the response was good, for McNary's progressive record is known and the fact that his pioneer parents were natives of Kentucky was decidedly in his favor.

Continues the scout: Cactus Jack Garner can carry the south, so can Secretary of State Cordell Hull of Tennessee, with Postmaster Gen. Jim Farley on the tail of the ticket. Neither Garner nor Hull, although part of the new deal administration are themselves new dealers. The deep south is definitely against another term for Franklin Delano Roosevelt and any new dealer he might wish as a successor.

With the zeal of the old Anti-Saloon League the colored politicians are preparing to cash in on their very important voting strength in the northern states. A safe prediction is that the house of representatives will pass the anti-lynching bill before the nominating conventions, but the measure will be stymied in the senate by southern senators, led by Texas Tom Connally. Ten percent of the entire population of the United States is colored and the new deal won these voters away from the republican party.

To the "White House this week went a request, almost a demand, that the president appoint 50 Negroes as cadets to the naval academy at Annapolis; that 5000 Negroes be enlisted for training in the marine corps and the navy; that the army train 100 Negroes for officers in the air corps; that these Negroes be stationed at the Virgin Islands and that one of the proposed 45,000 ton battleships be named Booker T. Washington.

This interesting Washington—Immigration Commissioner Houtaling (he married a cousin of the president), has revoked the permits of a number of Czechs who were to teach the 800 Americans already employed by the Jan Bata shoe factory because CIO objected. Bata is building a \$10,000,000 plant a few miles from the capital, will employ thousands unless new dealers crack down on him—Roosevelt boys have an affinity for automobile accidents. Son Elliott and Son F. D. Jr., both had teeth knocked out recently, Elliott in Texas, Junior in Maryland.—"Bill" Douglas, associate justice, gads around in society more than any of the other members on the tribunal.

AN EDITORIAL ON HEALTH

Investigations in 1930 showed the possibility of sterilization of air in operating rooms with ultra-violet rays.

Increasing attention was paid to psychosomatic medicine, which involves control of the mental factors in organic disease, and which is applicable particularly in such varying conditions as asthma, high blood pressure and arthritis.

The electroencephalograph was established as especially useful in determining the nature of some forms of epilepsy.

It was shown that certain forms of rheumatism may be caused in mice by experimental injections.

It was shown that the germs of infantile paralysis may sometimes enter the body by way of the mouth.

Bacteriologists proved that swine influenza may be related to human influenza, and intimated that swine may constitute the means by which influenza is kept alive between periods of epidemics.

A new drug, prostigmine, was shown to be valuable in the weakening disease of the muscles known as myasthenia gravis.

In December, a new product for the treatment of syphilis was announced by Stanford University where the preparation of bismuth, known as sobliminol, was discovered. This preparation must be taken under the direction of a physician, and is indicated only in certain cases.

From the social medical point of view, special attention was given to the problems of the refugee physicians who have come into the United States; to the medical care of the aged who present a special problem, both from the physical and economic points of view; to the licensing of drivers of motor vehicles, with special reference to the care of the eyes and to determination of alcoholic intoxication.

The Nobel prize in medicine was awarded to Demag of Germany, who is credited with having introduced the use of sulfanilamide.

Outstanding among deaths of physicians during 1934 was the passing of Dr. Harvey Cushing, who won the Pulitzer prize for his "Life of Sir William Osler," and the deaths of the two famous Mayo brothers, Drs. William J. and Charles H. Mayo, whose surgical accomplishments and organization ability made them leaders in medicine throughout the world.
