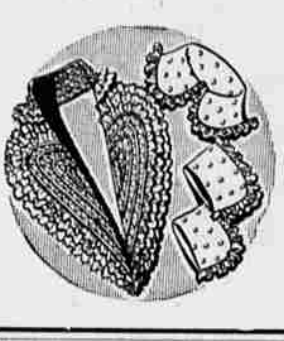
Mars, Jupiter to Be Near Each Other This Weekend

Mars and Jupiter appear very near each other in the sky this week-end. Such a condition occurs every few years, and leads those romantically inclined to endow the red war god is again charging madly at the peace-loving old king of the gods. Granting this to be true, we have never seen these Martian gestures amount to any more than a bluff, for neither of the ancient deities has ever suffered a scratch in these encounters.
Not since 1937 have these planets appeared very near each other. Even then they were not quite so close together as now.
The closest approach occurs at about our daybreak January 7.
The planets will then be only slightly more than one degree apart, with Mars above Jupiter. But they will then be below the horizon for those of us on this side of the world. They will, however, be nearly as close the evenings of January 6 and 7—and not far apart for several nights thereafter—so will present a very interesting sight as the smaller red planet huddles near the brilliant yellow Jupiter.
You can easily spot these planets by looking almost due south and quite high in the sky between 5 and 6 o'clock in the evening. They move westward as the night advances, and before midnight will dip beneath the horizon.
It will be interesting to watch these worlds for a few weeks in order to note how rapidly Mars moves eastward from Jupiter. Although they now are seen in the same part of the sky, yet actually they are very far from each other. Tonight Mars is 120,000,000 miles from us, Jupiter is four times as far back in space.
