### Rescuers Slow Frenzied Digging as Hopes Vanish

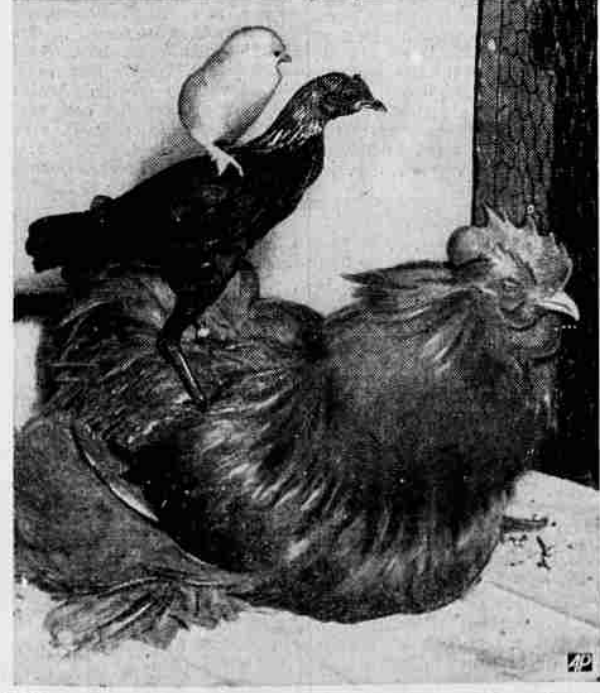

### Eugene Schools Get Efficient Health Program

### Dr. Anderson Shares Time Between City Schools, University

Arrangements for complete cooperation of staff members and coordination of work which will result in providing Eugene and Lane county with one of the most modern and efficient health education programs for public schools in this part of the country was announced Saturday by J. B. Cramer, city superintendent of schools.

### Actual Field Work, as well as part of the instruction to prospective teachers, will be largely under the direction of Dr. Paul Anderson, who will serve half time as physician for Eugene public schools, and devote the rest of his time to the school of physical education.

### Examinations for All

Included in the program will be physical examinations for all pupils as soon as possible, and a scientific approach to all health problems in the schools.

### Cooperation

Dr. Thompson cites the following cooperative factors: inclusion on the health department staff of the Eugene school nurse for 12 months service in Eugene instead of nine months as formerly; addition of a new nurse to the health department for service in Eugene schools and the community; increase in funds for public health nurse from the Cottage Grove school district as a recognition of the need for year round service; and developing of good will and understanding between the staffs of the health and education departments of the county, the schools, university and the public.

ABERDEEN, Jan. 13.—(AP)—Friends, fellow CIO officials and "alibi witnesses" for Dick Law, husband of a young Aberdeen Finnish woman slain a week ago, will respond to subpoenas to testify at the coroner's inquest Monday into the axe murder, but otherwise will not cooperate with investigating authorities, the group said today.

The inquest was called yesterday, because, Deputy Prosecutor Manley said, some witnesses for Law had refused to answer questions.

The promise of new snow and cold weather will send many skiers to the upper McKenzie Sunday to enjoy their sport.

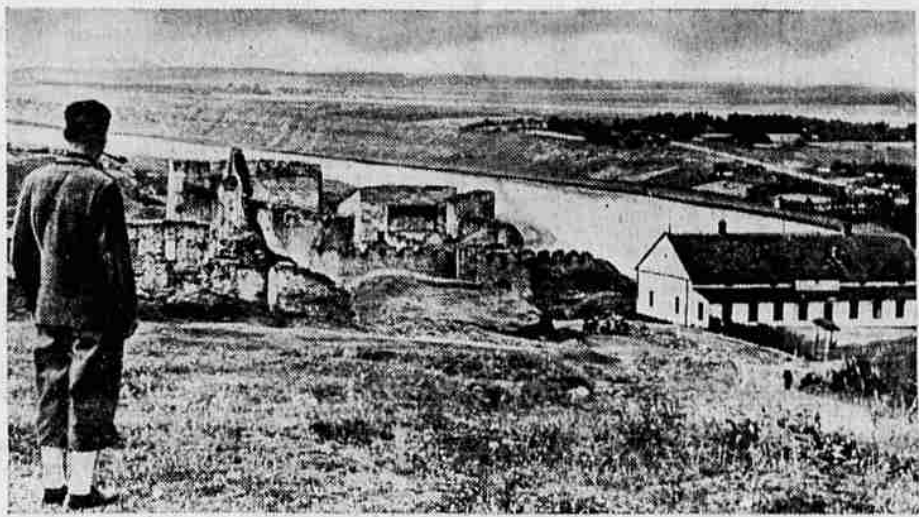

### Extra Defense Taxes Loom

### 460 Million Estimated May Not Be Enough

WASHINGTON, Jan. 13.—(AP)—A possibility developed today that "emergency" outlays for national defense, which President Roosevelt has recommended be financed by additional taxes, might exceed the \$460,000,000 estimate made in the president's budget.

### New Taxes

The president made no allowance for funds to start these ships when he advised congress that the national defense bill would be increased \$460,000,000 as a result of the emergency created by the European war. Legislators conjectured, therefore, whether the politically distasteful job of voting new taxes in an election year might be made even more difficult by the naval expansion program.

### Soviets Deny All Finn Victory Claims

### Italy Seen Opposed To Soviet Aggression

ANKARA, Jan. 13.—(AP)—Indications that Italy is taking the lead for a "united front" in southeastern Europe against possible aggression by Soviet Russia were hailed widely today as meaning double security for Turkey.

### Study Security

The western hemisphere's security zone, designed to insulate the Americas from the European conflict, will undergo the study of the inter-American neutrality committee Monday in Rio de Janeiro.

### Ousted High School Teacher Wants to Go Back to Work

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Jan. 13.—(AP)—Victor Jewett, discharged as a teacher at the Eureka junior high school in 1935 because of alleged "communistic" tendencies, sought a renewal of his teaching credentials at a meeting of the state board of education Friday.

### Certificate Expires

Jewett's dismissal by the Eureka school board was upheld by the third district court of appeals which declared "it was evident Jewett violated his oath of loyalty to the United States." Jewett was denied further hearing by the California supreme court and his teaching credentials expired last Nov. 30 because he was unable to give evidence of successful teaching experience during the life of the certificate.

### Red Bombers Kill Two in Attack On Finns

### Nazi Planes Zoom Over English Coast, British Scout Westward

The war in the air held the spotlight today for the fifth successive day in the European conflict with German scouts speeding over Britain's east coast and British fliers ranging as far as Austria and Bohemia.

### Planes Over England

German scouts ranged over Britain from the English channel to strategic Scottish harbors in flights today.

### The British said they shot down one of the raiders this morning off southeast Scotland.

The German high command in a report confined to yesterday's operations said a British plane was shot down on the western front and another when eight bombers made an unsuccessful attack on German destroyers in Heligoland light.

### Major Battle Pends

In the Finnish-Russian hostilities, Scandinavian advisers said Russian troops had been withdrawn from part of Leningrad, Finland's Arctic port, and that both Russian and Finnish forces were being strengthened on the Salla front, further south but still above the Arctic circle, apparently for a major battle.

### In southeastern Finland where the Mannerheim line has balked Russian attempts to advance, the invaders were reported to be advising the defense troops over loudspeakers to "surrender within 48 hours or the Germans are coming."

### Gas Masks Popular After Air Raids

LONDON, Jan. 13.—(AP)—Gas masks regained their popularity today after two days of German air raids on the British coast.

### The usual complacency of people in the street had been noticeably shaken and gas masks, discarded weeks ago by nine persons out of 10, were almost universal again. Air raid protection authorities in London planned a new recruiting campaign. Resignations because of inactivity and fear of the loss of peacetime jobs, had cut heavily into the ARP ranks.
