Jameson Sees Physical Education In Field Of Social Science

Physical education has a great possibility of becoming a social science, it is declared in an article, written by Dr. Samuel H. Jameson, professor of sociology at the University of Oregon, which appears in a current issue of "The Journal of Health and Physical Education." From the point of view of its objectives, particularly in view of the public demand, its interests lie more in the field of social than in physical science, he points out.

The article, which is a digest of a talk delivered by Dr. Jameson before the Northwest District Association of physical education teachers last spring, goes thoroughly into the whole field of this vocation.

Dr. Jameson concludes: "Like the history of any science, education has groped for self-discovery. Assiduous endeavors in objective experiments may push her into the ring of social sciences. The task of physical education majors or instructors is to test the validity of their data, discover the operating processes, and forget the passing fancies of personal skills and exhibitionistic artistry.

"This is a painful and laborious procedure fraught with failure, but promising enough if one wishes to follow the steps established by the existing scientific disciplines. Until then physical education shall remain outside the pale of social sciences in spite of its social content."
