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Grove Rod, Gun Club Will Sell Stamps

COTTAGE GROVE, March 13.—(Special)—The local Rod and Gun club will handle the sale of wildlife stamps during the week March 17-23. Funds from the sale of these stamps are used for restoration projects, conservation and education in everything pertaining to wild life. Twenty-five per cent of the funds will be used in this vicinity and the remainder is used nationally.

The club voted favorably on two measures in regard to the control of fisheries and streams. House Bill 6321, which is in committee now, is a national bill which imposes a tax of 10 per cent on fishing tackle, the funds from which will be used to assist states to establish more fish hatcheries. A resolution is to be sent to Congress recommending federal control of the Columbia river fishing which is now controlled under a tri-state agreement.

The club was presented with a sign for the club grounds by H. M. Bird. It is of the type used to designate forest camps. Mr. Bird was assisted in making the sign by CCC boys from the Tiller camp, where he is now located. The next meeting of the club will be the annual meeting and committees were appointed to plan the program for that evening.

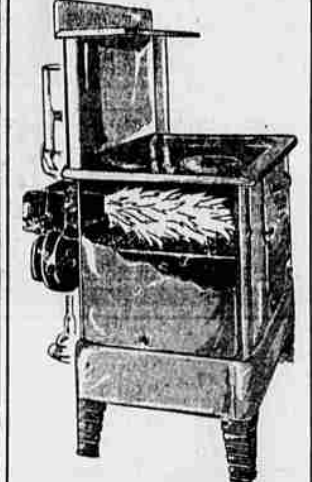
From Myrtle Point
