

REGISTRATION INSTRUCTION PLACARD

are the questions each man registering will be asked. The registrar (who will ask the questions) and the registrant (who will give the answers) will be by these instructions. The registrar will study them carefully before registration day. Each man who registers should read them carefully and have answers ready when he reaches the registration desk.

Questions will be asked in the order in which they are numbered on the card. Be prompt in answering each question. All answers will be written on registration card in INK by the registrar who must be careful to spell all names correctly, and see that all entries are clear and easy to read.

SERIAL NUMBER (Leave this blank)		1. Name (Print) (Give your first name first, then your middle name in full, and your family name last. Spell out each name as you give it. Example: Say "John Louis Jones" and not "Jones, John Louis.") (First) (Middle) (Last)		ORDER NUMBER (Leave this blank)	
Address (Print) (Give the address where you actually live. If you do not live at a particular address then give the address where mail will reach you quickly. Give your address in this manner: "23189 Alaska Avenue, Chicago, Ill." or "Box 221, R. F. D. No. 1, Jonesville, Jones County, Kans.") (Number and street or R. F. D. number) (Town) (County) (State)					
Telephone (Give the number where you can easily reach either your home phone or your phone, or the phone of a neighbor. Telephone exchange and city. Example: "Mowat 6294" or "Jonesville, 3 long." If you have no phone, answer "None.")		4. Age in Years (Give your age in years as of last birthday. Don't give months or days. Example: If you are "20 years 11 months" old, just say "20 years.") Date of Birth (Give, in order, the month, day, and year of your birth, such as "Sept. 20, 1910.") (Mo.) (Day) (Yr.)		5. Place of Birth (Give the city or town, county and State and the country in which you were born. If foreign born, give the name of the country in which your place of birth was located at the time of your birth, even though the name of your country has been changed.) (Town or county) (State or country)	
6. Country of Citizenship (Give the name of the country of which you are a citizen. If a United States citizen, answer "U. S. A." If you are a citizen of a foreign country, give the name of that country. If you have taken out first papers only, you are not a citizen of the U. S. A. Give the country of which you are still a citizen. If you have an alien registration card, give the number here.)		8. Relationship of That Person (Give the relationship to you of the person who you have said will always know where to find you quickly. Example: "Wife," "Mother," "Friend," "Employer," "Neighbor," etc.)			
Name of Person Who Will Always Know Your Address (Give the name of the person most likely to know your whereabouts at all times. If you are living with your wife, parents, or other close relatives, give the name of the family who can locate you easiest and quickest. If you are not living with your family, give the name of some person who can locate you quickly. In answering this question, say "Mr.," "Mrs.," or "Miss," followed by the first name, middle name, and then the last name of the person. Example: "Mr. Henry Jones," or "Miss Susan Brown," or "Mrs. Charles Black." (Mr., Mrs., Miss) (First) (Middle) (Last)					
Address of That Person (Give the address of this person. Give first the street number, then the street name or R. F. D. number, city or town, county, and finally the State. Example: "23189 Alaska Avenue, Chicago, Ill.") (Number and street or R. F. D. number) (Town) (County) (State)					
Employer's Name (Give the name of the company, firm, or person by whom you are employed. Give the company name, not your foreman's name. If you are in business for yourself, answer "Self." If you are employed by more than one employer, give the name of the one who can usually reach you. If you are a Federal, State, or local government employee, give the department or bureau for which you work. If you are working on a WPA project, answer "WPA project." If you are not working and are a college student registering in the college precinct, say "Jonesville College, student." If you are unemployed, not on WPA, and not attending school, answer "None." Examples: "Jones Hardware Co.," or "Jonesville Post Office," or "N. Y. State Highway Dept.," or "WPA project," or "Jonesville College, student," or "None.")					
Place of Employment or Business (Give the street number or location of the place where you are employed. Also give the city or town, county, and the State. If you are in business for yourself, give your business address. If you are on WPA, give the address of the WPA assignment office. If you are a student in a college and not working, give the college address. If you have answered "None" when asked for your employer's name, the registrar will enter a dash (-) and will not ask this question.) (Number and street or R. F. How Vote Keeps In CIO Union
GREEN, Wash., Oct. 12.—The international wood-

workers of America (CIO), by the narrow margin of 10 votes, today had refused to bar communists from membership in the organization. The vote came on the majority report of a constitutional amendment which recommended

against an anti-communist bloc proposal to bar communists, fascists, nazis and their supporters. The vote was 134 to 124, with 15 delegates not voting.

Greeks Watch On Albania Frontier

ATHENS, Greece, Oct. 12.—(P)—High Greek authorities, pushing defense measures as German military power spread in nearby Rumania, declared today that this country is ready to pull the trigger in case of any surprise attack.

The Greek army is mobilized along the frontier of Italian-occupied Albania where it is reported 120,000 to 150,000 Italian troops are being gradually reinforced.

No figures were disclosed, however, as to the number of Greeks under arms.

Japanese Ships Still Loading Scrap Iron

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 12.—(UP)—Four Japanese freighters were in Pacific coast ports today, speeding the loading of scrap-iron to beat the presidential embargo, only five days away.

The Bordeaux Maru docked here late yesterday to load around 3,000 tons of scrap, according to Intercocean Steamship company. The ship's agents, The Arizona Maru is now loading at Portland and the Kuwayama Maru and Cuba Maru are at Seattle, taking on scrap iron. It was believed other vessels were loading at Los Angeles harbor.

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Bulgaria Strengthens Border With Rumania

SOFIA, Bulgaria, Oct. 12.—(AP)—German-made anti-aircraft batteries and sound detection equipment to control their fire were reported today to have been installed along the Bulgarian side of the Danube river and the Plovdiv railway line to Turkey.

Bulgaria's anti-aircraft defenses were reported to have been especially strengthened opposite the important Rumanian oil port of Giurgiu, where German troops are being stationed.

Official circles declined to comment on the reports, but they pointed out that Germany has been selling considerable armament to Bulgaria in recent months in a plan of "military coordination" among Bulgaria, Hungary and the Axis.
