There was only one encouraging note on the home gridiron front. That came last Friday night at Portland, when John Warren's Ducklings finally beat an Oregon State outfit by coming from behind in the last quarter.

And what a ball game that was. The Ducklings, underdogs in the betting by 8 points, started out by looking just like last year's over-publicized Fresh outfit, which is just another way of saying on-terrible Oregon State started to go for a touchdown right from the opening kickoff.

But the Ducklings managed to brace and hold, and then took over. With Jimmy Newquist, erstwhile "Camaz Cyclone," in the driver's seat, and with the gridiron on the front line showing lots of offensive ability, the Ducklings started to roll slowly.

They ruled an ancient Oregon 69 in the early minutes of the second half when they bogged down, got careless, and eventually let Lewis Shelton, Rook 200-plus fullback from Union, go romping off his own left tackle and down the west sidelines for a 54-yard touchdown.

But at that point their resemblance to Oregon freshman squads stopped. Big Brad Ecklund, blond-haired center from Milwaukie, came booming down the middle to block the Rook try for point, a little piece of efficient business that later meant the game for the Ducklings.

Then Newquist went to work with some of his unbelievably deceptive running. He worked the ball into Beaver territory, and then John sent Larry Olson, aerialist extraordinaire from San Francisco, into the game in a last-second endeavor to knot the score.

Olson's accurate arm tossed the sphere into the waiting arms of End Bert Gianelli on the one-yard marker, where it was first and one to go to even the count. Oregon took a 5-yard penalty for surplus times out to stop the clock—only seconds remained in the game—then was stopped by a determined Beaver line. Another 5-yard penalty to stop that pesky clock, and the Oregon team was back to it.

At this point Olson threw Gianelli a pass for a touchdown, but the officials ruled both teams were officials, nullifying the tally and causing Gianelli to whang that ball to the ground in the end zone in very evident disgust.

The half ended any further attempts.

The Frosh had the edge for the entire third quarter, mainly on Newquist's punting ability, which kept the Rooks deep in their territory. When Inky Boe took Jimmy's place late in the third period, the Washington triple-threat got one of the biggest ovations ever accorded a freshman footballer.

Boe must have been inspired a little, for the Milwaukie star immediately punned eight yards. Then he threw a pass down the center for a first down, just before the quarter ended.

Two more passes at the start of the fourth period and Oregon had scored its first touchdown in three games against the Rooks Reserve. Quarterback Laurence Stepper backed, his foot made an arc, and the score was 7-6 and the game was Oregon's.

The question is—just how good did they look as prospects for the varsity? The main thing is whether they'll be able to cut the conference mustard.

They will, Jimmy Newquist will be a sophomore sensation next year, if he doesn't let his clipping blind him too much, Olson and Boe should help Oliver quite a bit as "elmax" offensive runners.

On the line, former Eugene high star Chuck Elliott looked especially good as did the other guard, Acting Captain Paul Foomos. Three ends, Larry Lovelady and Gianelli, showed enough stuff to indicate that they will last beyond the first year. The two huge tackles made a few mistakes, but they'll be on that varsity. And Brad Ecklund should be an exact replica of Rudy Michs.

Yep, John Warren managed to mold quite an outfit together since September 10. Things are looking up.

Maybe next year, as the nation's coaches perennially are wont to exclaim.

Don Leal Stages Comeback to Capture Third City Golf Title

Sid Milligan Beaten, 2 and 1

Rain-Swept Laurelwood Course Yields to Aces

Don Leal staged one of the most sensational golfing comebacks in local history over the rain-swept Laurelwood course Sunday when he defeated Sid Milligan in the finals of the 11th annual city championship tournament. The final count was 2-and-1 over the 36-hole route. The victory gave Leal permanent possession of the Babb trophy, having won the award on two previous occasions. Milligan was also a two-time winner.

The struggle fairways and slow wet grounds hindered Leal during the morning four and after Milligan had won the first hole in the afternoon he found himself four down. But that was the last hole Milligan won and Leal steadily closed the gap until the match was even-up on the 28th tee.

Leal won the first hole, but Milligan collected a birdie four on the third to even the count. Another birdie, with a three on the seventh, gave Milligan a one-hole lead which Leal again evened with a birdie four on the ninth.

Leal went one-up on the 10th, but the score was again even when Milligan won the 11th. Birdies on the 13th and 15th gave Milligan a two-hole lead. Leal won the 16th, but Milligan took the next two holes, the 17th with another birdie, to go to lunch with a three-hole lead.

Milligan won the 19th with a birdie, but Leal opened up by taking four of the next eight holes, the 27th with a birdie four, to even the match at the turn. He blasted out a four-under par 31 on the final nine holes—winning the 29th and 32nd to go 2-up and three to go. The two ace golfers halved 16, 34th with pars and the 35th with birdies, ending the festivities. Both shot par threes on the final hole.

Champion Under Par
Leal completed the 36 holes par with an aggregate 170, four under par while Milligan had 142, two under perfect figures. Leal collected 28 pars and six birdies, Milligan 22 pars and eight birdies. There were no eagles.

Death Takes Salem's No. 1 Sportsman

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 21.—(P)—George E. Waters, 70, pioneer wholesale tobacco merchant and owner of the Salem baseball team of the Western International league, died Saturday night following a heart attack.

A native of Nebraska City, Neb., he came to Salem with his parents when four years old. After driving a dray for the Wells Fargo Express company and working as a hotel bellboy, he joined with C. C. Minto of Salem in opening a cigar store in 1891.

The cigar store was the forerunner of the George E. Waters, Inc., wholesale tobacco and confectionery.

Waters purchased the Western International baseball league franchise for Salem last year, built a \$60,000 park and gave Salem its first professional baseball team. A feature of the park was that youngsters meeting certain requirements were admitted free.

Survivors include the widow, two brothers, Frank and Harry Waters, both of Salem; a sister, Mrs. W. C. Knighton of Portland; a nephew and a niece.

Leading Collegiate Eleven Retain Sectional Positions

NEW YORK, Oct. 21.—(P)—The 1934 college football season is half over, roughly speaking, and for the first time it is possible to approach with some confidence the task of naming those sectional leaders who still are in line for national honors.

The more important teams have followed "form" quite closely for the past week or two in everything but the size of the scores, so there are few, if any, cases of title contenders being upset by low ranking teams or of beaten outfits coming back into the races.

The list of undefeated and untied major teams still is an imposing one but barring form reversals in this week's program of major games it should take in all the candidates for the mythical national championship.

In this category are Boston College, Georgetown, Cornell, Pennsylvania and Fordham in the East, with such teams as Navy, Penn State, Columbia, Rutgers, Lafayette and Franklin and Marshall still boasting clean slates. In the South are Tennessee, Mississippi and Clemson; Northwestern, Michigan and Minnesota, the "Big Three" of the Big Ten, and Notre Dame and Detroit in the Middle-west; Texas A&M and Texas in the Southwest and Stanford on the Pacific coast.

Unbeaten but tied once or more are Mississippi State, Kentucky, Southern Methodist, Texas Tech and Southern California. Others still in line for sectional and conference laurels, although beaten by outsiders, include Holy Cross, Villanova, Duquesne, Duke, Washington and Lee, Georgia Tech, Indiana; three Big Six teams, Missouri, Nebraska and Oklahoma; Colorado and Denver in the Big Seven; Rice, which hasn't played in the southwest conference, and Washington.

Each won from Oregon, 13-0. Stanford is charging and Southern California is chugging. Tab Stanford to even up for that 33-0 pasting last season.
