WA Director Plans Visit Here December 2

David Lillenthal, director of the Tennessee valley authority, will be in the University of Oregon campus Monday, December 2, to address several campus and Eugene groups and to confer with students of faculty on recent developments of the new deal's power development program, it was announced today by Karl W. Orank, dean of personnel administration.

An assembly talk, which will be held in the general public, is scheduled for Gerlinger hall at 11 a. m. on the day of Mr. Lillenthal's visit. The 41-year-old lawyer, who was admitted to the Illinois bar in 1923, will also address the Young Men's Club and other service clubs holding a joint meeting at 8 p. m.

Mr. Lillenthal associated himself 10 years ago with Donald R. Richards, counsel for the city of Chicago in utility matters and general counsel for the railroad brotherhoods and other national labor unions at that time. He worked on a number of cases involving the labor.

Southern Lane Roads Found Being Damaged by Project Hauling

Damage is being done to county roads in the vicinity of Cottage Grove over which rock is being hauled for the Willamette basin above that city, and something will have to be done to prevent further injury, county road officials said Wednesday.

There is a possibility that the heavy hauling over the road may be prohibited altogether, County Engineer P. M. Morse said.

The contractors are hauling rock from Row River in the vicinity of the steel bridge east of Cottage Grove. The surface of the roads is already beginning to show the wear of the constant pounding and it is feared it will begin to break down in the very near future if something is not done about it.

The road officials Wednesday also discussed the improvement of the road leading from the McKenzie highway a short distance east of Springfield, crossing the mill-race and extending to the Seavey ferry on the Willamette. Two gravel companies and one logging outfit are using the road and it is badly cut up. The surface never was heavy but the county court plans to strengthen it so that these industrial concerns may continue to operate.

More Business Seen For Pacific Northwest

TACOMA, Nov. 21.—(AP)—The Pacific northwest, already booming, can expect an even greater surge in business, William M. Jeffers of Omaha, president of the Union Pacific railroad believes. "We have been building up our rolling stock and lines to handle this business," Jeffers, on an inspection tour, said. "We can handle it, no matter what happens in the way of troop movements or other military demands."

Jeffers predicted an increase in the fruit and grain business. "Put men back on private pay rolls and you solve the farm problem," he said. "We expect rising prices to make the fruit business better this coming summer and fall. Livestock prices are rising and we expect grain to follow."

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
