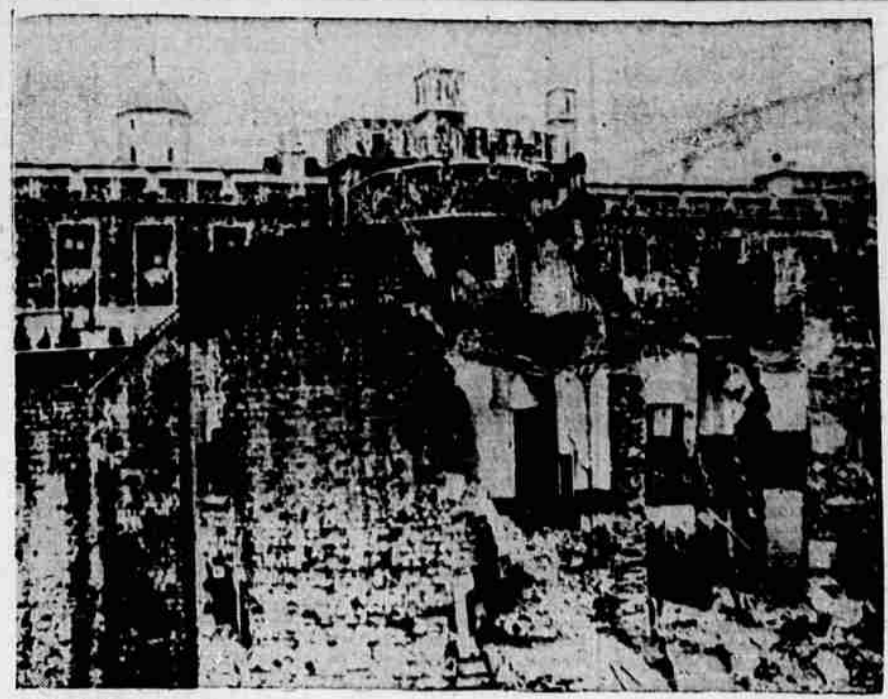


Profession Helper Announced At U-O

Students of the University of Oregon who are puzzled over their courses or not they have a chance to get good in their chosen profession, or those who have not decided what they want to do when they graduate, now have an opportunity to take aptitude tests to get advice from the personal research bureau, it was announced here Wednesday by Dr. E. Taylor, head of the bureau. Two types of service will be available. It is announced. The first service will include a suitable set of questions, a report on the results and a non-technical interpretation for use in counseling. The diagnostic counseling service will be extended to students who have particular problems. A student who has a discrepancy between interests and ability who has had unsatisfactory scholastic results, or is just undecided may make use of the service. Only charge for actual materials used. Students will be under no compulsion to follow recommendations of the bureau, but the material is of considerable value, it is pointed out.

House Faces Fight Over Controversial Bill

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21.—(AP)—A decisive house defeat of an amendment to the Logan-Walter bill is long-deferred chance for the bill to pass. Administration leaders, who predict a presidential veto for the measure, were hopeful it would pass in committee at the close of the 76th congress, but the house voted 191 to 148 against the bill yesterday. The bill would place all new munitions and airplane plants between the Rocky Appalachian Mountains, and closer than 200 miles of the north and south borders.

Sober Folks Best Drivers? Crusader Disproves Point!

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 21.—(AP)—All in the interest of science, the police department's foremost crusader against drunk driving got two-thirds tight and proved he could drive a car better after six Scotch and sodas than the average motorist can when he's sober. Capt. Bernard R. Caldwell, 39, heads the police traffic control bureau. He returned a few days ago from 10,000-mile trip through the middle west, lecturing on the evils of mixing gasoline and alcohol.

The greater Los Angeles safety council set about to prove the same thing scientifically. It used 12 subjects, mostly policemen and brewery experts. The council proved its point but Caldwell proved the exception that proves the rule.

His six drinks contained an ounce of 86-proof apiece, taken at half-hour intervals. Other participants tried other liquors—rye, bourbon, wine and beer. A 250-pounder topped seven beers with four Scotches and still finished well up on the list. Worst reaction was from a brewery association secretary who had eight beers.

With most of the group, there was a noticeable lessening in co-ordinating ability after four drinks—a definite drop after six. But Caldwell, in some respects, improved as he went along.

The testing machine is a full-size driver's compartment, with steering wheel and brake pedal. Before the "motorist" are red and green signal lights and a moving panorama with a highway in the center. Test No. 1 is reaction to emergency—the time required to reach the brake after the light flashes red. Greek Losses High, Roman Version Holds

ROME, Nov. 21.—(AP)—Strong Greek attacks on Italian forces southeast of Koriza in Albania and on both sides of the Kalibaki highway in Epirus, northwest Greece, have been repulsed with heavy Greek losses, the Italian high command claimed today.

Striking at the Suez canal, eastern gate to the Mediterranean, Italian bombers Monday night attacked a seaplane base and ships in the harbor of Great Bitter lake, high basin in the canal itself, the high command said. Also attacked was Ismailia, a large port midway in the canal.

Stefani, the Italian news agency, reported that a violent fire broke out on one merchant ship in the lake, and large fires occurred at the seaplane base.

DOWNEY, Calif., Nov. 21.—(AP)—The huge, sprawling factory of the Vultee aircraft company remained closed by a strike today but there was some possibility that secrecy concerning negotiations to reopen the plant might be lifted. There was also a hint that progress had been made.

The strike was called by the united automobile and aircraft workers last Friday after their demands for an increase in basic pay had been denied.
