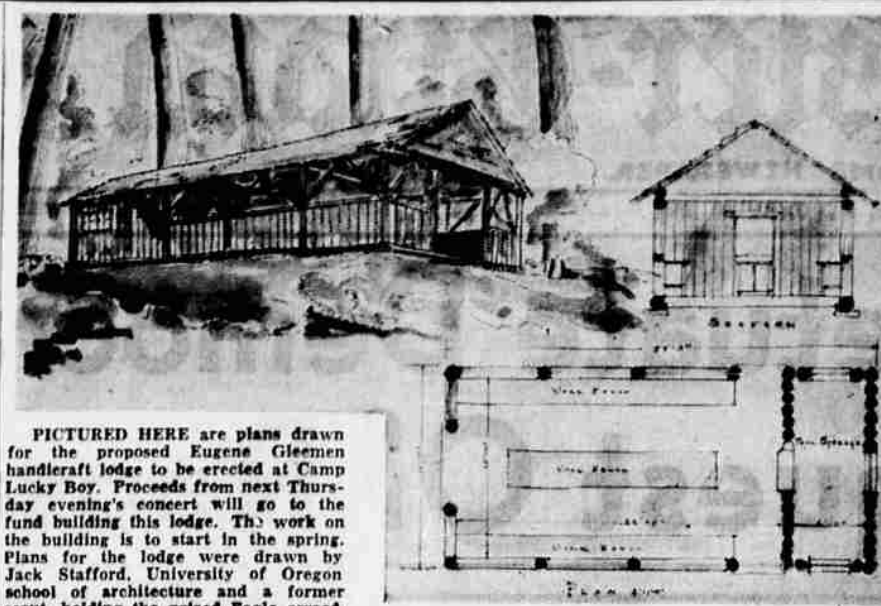

Weather Still Holds Bomber Searchers

TACOMA, Wash., Jan. 20.—(AP)—Snow, rain and fog were expected to ground again today 30 army planes waiting to search between Tacoma and Sacramento, Calif., for a twin-motored bomber, missing since Thursday with seven men.

The planes have been stationed at strategic points, to take off as soon as the weather clears, but there has been continuous rain or snow since the bomber disappeared.

Authorities feared that the ship was down in an isolated section of the Siskiyou mountains. If it is, its discovery from the air will be almost impossible until late spring. The Siskiyou are blanketed with five to 10 feet of snow winter long.

Roosevelt Takes Vow For Third Time

battled democracies everywhere in the world. He had discussed those points in detail in his fire-side chat of Dec. 29, and his message on the state of the union on Jan. 7.

Instead, he based his third inaugural on a defense of the democratic principle, from which stems the determination of America to extend this aid.

It was a call to service for democracy and a profession of faith that the democratic principle is so essential in the nature of man that it cannot be stamped out by mailed fists.

The fundamentals of the American republic, Mr. Roosevelt proclaimed, have survived the impact of the economic forces which operated against it eight years ago and all subsequent events.

"Prophets of the downfall of American democracy have seen their dire predictions come to naught," he said. "Democracy is not dying."

It Has Grown

"We know it because we have seen it revive—and grow. We know it cannot die—because it is built on the unhampered initiative of individual men and women joined together in a common enterprise—an enterprise undertaken and carried through by the free expression of a free majority."

"We know it because democracy alone, of all forms of government, enlists the full force of men's enlightened will."

"We know it because democracy alone has constructed an unlimited civilization capable of infinite progress in the improvement of human life."

He spoke of the "spirit" of a nation as the most important element of its life—more vital than its body or its mind. And he added:

"If the spirit of America were killed, even though the nation's body and mind, constricted in an alien world, lived on, the America we know would have perished."

"If we lose that sacred fire—if we let it be smothered with doubt and fear—then we shall reject the destiny which Washington strove so valiantly and so triumphantly to establish. The preservation of the spirit and faith of the nation does, and will, furnish the highest justification for every sacrifice that we may make in the cause of national defense."

The president, noting that "we acted quickly, boldly, decisively" eight years ago when American life "seemed frozen by a fatalistic terror" over uncontrolled economic forces, promised again that the social objectives of his administration still are to be maintained.

"The hopes of the republic cannot forever tolerate either under-served poverty or self-serving wealth," he declared. "We know that we still have far to go; that we must more greatly build the security and the opportunity and the knowledge of every citizen, in the measure justified by the resources and the capacity of the land."

But, said Mr. Roosevelt, it is not enough to provide clothing and food and instruction for the body of the republic. The spirit must be revived, for the spirit is the greatest of the three components.

Before taking the oath, President Roosevelt had gone to his native St. Johns Episcopal church to ask for divine guidance.

Miss Hooker gave the impartial analysis of why the problem exists, quoting statistics and conditions placing women either in the home or out in the world to take their place in the business and working world. Miss South then gave what she believed a solution to the problem. Marvin A. Krenk, teacher of the course, was at the meeting and introduced the speakers. The symposium has toured many parts of the state giving these presentations and talks.

Liquor Battle Looms Before Legislators

wines sold, kept or offered for sale in violation of the proposed law.

The legislature, after a three-day rest, was back at work today to begin the second week of the session. Since the 1940 legal code has been certified, many bills will be introduced early this week.

Sen. Ronald R. Jones (R., Marion) and Rep. H. R. Jones (R., Marion) said they would sponsor a bill to restrict sale of distilled wines to liquor stores, and to provide that such wines shall be bottled at the winery, instead of being shipped to Oregon in tank cars and bottled here.

Bills to reappoint the legislature will be considered in the house by a nine-man committee that will represent each section of the state, Speaker Robert S. Farrell said.

Two reappointment bills have been introduced. One by Rep. Richard L. Neuberger (D., Multnomah) would increase Multnomah county's delegation in each house at the expense of eastern and southern Oregon. One by Rep. E. W. Kimberling (R., Grant) would give each county at least one representative, and would leave Multnomah county's house delegation at 13 members. The measure would not affect the senate.

A constitutional amendment would have to be approved if the Kimberling bill were to become valid, since the constitution provides that apportionment be based on population.

Nazi Occupation Topic of Letter

According to an uncensored letter from The Netherlands which has been received by Dr. and Mrs. Quirinus Breen, assistant professor of social science and history at the University of Oregon, the Germans are repeating in Holland what they have done in the other conquered countries.

Arriving in the United States from Amsterdam by way of Siberia, the letter stated that it is impossible for the Hollanders under the new regime to trust even their best friends.

To listen to any radio programs other than from a German broadcasting station is punishable by confiscation of the radio and a \$10,000 fine, or two years in prison. An informer of any such listening is given a reward of \$50.

Friends of the Breen's who are connected with public relations in Holland wrote in the letter that they listen to foreign stations. They hear English reports and broadcasts from CBS in New York. Because they have the advantage of understanding English they are well informed about what is going on in other parts of the world.

These people heard Winston Churchill's last broadcast and they also knew that Princess Juliana was going to visit the White House.

As for living conditions the Hollanders wrote that it is well-nigh impossible to obtain meat and fat. People were used to having dairy products but cheese, eggs and milk have to be sent into Germany. Beginning in November they also took butter fat from the milk and used it to make explosives. Grain, of which the Dutch had a good supply, was all taken.

Beginnings of the Jewish purge into Holland is evident because the letter gives the information that people are asked by the nazis to fill out questionnaires stating whether or not there is any Jewish blood in their families.
