

Eugene Employers Are Registering

Although many registrations of new employers subject to the state unemployment law have been made in the Eugene area recently because of the expansion of lumbering, dam-building and other industries, many more are expected before the end of January so as to avoid penalties for late payments of 1940 payroll taxes.

All employers who had a quarterly payroll over \$500 and who employed four or more workers on any one day are subject to the law. After once coming under provisions of the law, withdrawal may be made only during January upon showing that the firm was not subject during the preceding year. Those who hire eight or more for 20 weeks of the year also are subject to the federal law and must secure tax credit offset under the internal revenue code during January in order to escape payment of both taxes.

Further information concerning the law and its provisions may be secured at the state employment service on Sixth avenue west. On Thursday and Friday, Jan. 23 and 24, W. F. Toomey, an auditor from the central office, will be in Eugene to consult with employers who may be in doubt as to their status under the law, which has been in full effect for only three years. Mr. Toomey has been working in this area for several weeks but will spend the latter part of the week in the office especially to meet new employers and others who may be subject to the law.
