The Willamette forest Thursday reported a two-inch granular crust on top of a 42-inch-deep snow blanket. This is not good for skiing, but weather conditions were such late Thursday that more snow may be expected before the week-end.

Tuesday and Wednesday, several inches of fluffy snow fell, but rise of the temperature to 37 degrees late Wednesday, followed by the Wednesday night freezing temperature, resulted in the crust.

Similar conditions prevailed on the upper McKenzie. Skiers were warned that the road is closed above Alder Springs.

REALLY BOARD TAKES UP VARIOUS TOPICS

A plan to call on the chamber of commerce to secure an industrial survey from the Bonneville administration as a step toward securing greater industrial expansion for the Eugene area was suggested at the Realty Board Thursday noon by F. M. Bennett. The board did not take any action, Robert W. Prescott, board president, suggesting that since many members of the Realty board are members of the chamber that they work through the chamber and stating such a survey is within the field of the chamber of commerce. In making his suggestion Mr. Bennett pointed out the progress made by Washington cities in securing industrial plants. He expressed the opinion that with the recent tie-up of Eugene and Bonneville power this survey could be made.

Two new members were voted in to the Realty board, C. E. Hale and Mrs. Pansy Gillanders. Charles Wiper was inducted to membership Thursday by Mr. Prescott.

As a step toward making the Realty board an acting force working for the good of the board membership and for the good of the community's progress, Mr. Prescott highlighted a program of study for the year.

Under educational mandates for the board membership, he listed appraisals, clients, professional technique, knowing community assets, knowing community problems, and build your fraternity as six topics to be studied and led by board members. Under civic service mandates, Mr. Prescott listed community buying of real estate, community selling of real estate, assessing real estate fairly, appraisals of real estate, city and regional zoning and mobilization of community talents as six phases to be studied, each phase to have a leader.

Junior Colleges Aim Of Bill To House

SALEM, Jan. 23.—(P)—Junior colleges would be established in Portland, Klamath Falls, Bend, Astoria and in Coos and Umatilla counties by a bill introduced in the house today by Reps. Babcock (R-Umatilla), Horsch (D-Deschutes), Wilson (D-Columbia), Adams (D-Multnomah), and Allen (D-Multnomah), and Sons (D-Multnomah), and Kenin (R-Multnomah).

The measure, sponsored by the Oregon Commonwealth federation, would direct the state board of higher education to establish junior colleges in cities of more than 10,000 population situated more than 50 miles from the nearest college or normal school.

The junior colleges would give courses in subjects usually covered in the first two years of college, and would emphasize courses in mechanical, semi-professional and technical education.

The Letter Carriers' association asked Rep. Allan G. Carson (R-Marietta) to introduce a bill making the owner of a dog liable for damages if the dog bites a postman, or other persons legally on the owner's property.

Carson said he thinks he will introduce the bill.

Storms Hold Willkie On Atlantic Island

ABOARD THE YANKEE CLIPPER AT HORTA, THE AZORES, Jan. 23.—(P)—Wendell L. Willkie, riding a Pan-American clipper to Horta through a gale described by the plane's captain as the worst seen here in two years, faced a day's delay before continuing his trip to England.

Swells off Horta and stormy weather on the route to Lisbon caused Pan-American airways officials to defer the clipper's take-off until daybreak tomorrow. The plane arrived here at 7:30 a. m.

Enroute to study war conditions in Britain, Willkie already had seen evidence of United States aid to the British.

At Darnell island, off Hamilton, Bermuda, his eyes widened yesterday when he saw two 13-ton flying boats—bombers to be flown to Britain. Beside them he saw three famous veteran fliers—Bernie Bialchen, Clyde Pangborn, and Homer Berry—lazily tossing pennies.

"Ferrying bombers is getting dull," Berry, who fought with Canada in the World war and wore again a Canadian uniform, told Willkie. "I am joining a fighting unit soon."

Zeller, plant pathologist at the college, talked on control of diseases of small fruits.

Medford Believes Army Bomber Wreckage Lies In North California

MEDFORD, Jan. 23.—(P)—Officers in charge of army planes, using the Medford municipal airport as a base reported Thursday, a check of reports received indicated the army bomber missing a week, was last reported seen in the Walk and Sawyers Bar sections of northern California. The area is located on the south side of the Siskiyou mountains, on the Klamath river, 40 miles west from Yreka, Cal. It is wild and rugged country.

A dozen residents of the two sections reported hearing a plane last Thursday afternoon, about 4 o'clock. A plane was reported seen earlier over the district east of Klamath Falls.

Boys In Car Stolen In Eugene Captured In California

WILLITS, Cal., Jan. 23.—(P)—Less than an hour after they held up a local restaurant, three young men from Oregon and Idaho were captured by a highway patrol officer at Ukiah, 25 miles south of here, Sheriff E. L. Williams reported today.

The sheriff said the trio admitted stealing an automobile at Eugene, Ore., and holding up a service station at Gold Hill, Ore., last night.

The sheriff identified the arrested youths as James M. Potter, 18, and Lee Davis, 17, both of Ashland, Ore., and Robert Johnson, 17, of Emmett, Idaho. The officer quoted the Ashland boys as saying they had recently deserted from the 249th coast artillery, encamped at Fort Clatsop, Ore.

Food Stamp Executive Here To Explain Set-Up

Donald M. Watt, field representative of the surplus marketing administration of the federal government, will explain the food stamp plan, to be placed in operation in Lane county immediately, at a meeting of grocers and wholesalers, to be held in the circuit court room at the courthouse Monday evening, Jan. 27, at 8 o'clock. He will tell the grocers and other dealers how they will participate in the plan.

Mr. Watt is here from Portland for a few days and is making his headquarters at the Eugene hotel. He will speak over KORE radio station Monday at 7:15 p. m., just prior to the meeting in the courthouse, explaining the stamp plan to the general public and its participation in it.

Second District Judges Seek To Sit Together

SALEM, Jan. 23.—(P)—The three circuit judges in the second judicial district, which includes Benton, Coos, Curry, Douglas, Lane and Lincoln counties, would be permitted to hold court together in hearings in which they think three judges are needed, a bill introduced today by the Lane county delegation provides.

Japan To Arbitrate Siam Border Dispute

VICHY, France, Jan. 23.—(P)—The government announced today it had accepted Japanese offers of mediation in the undeclared border warfare between French Indochina and Thailand (Siam).

The French ambassador to Tokyo has been entrusted with the arrangement of ways and means of mediation with the Japanese government, the announcement said.

The Japanese offer to mediate was made Jan. 21, the government said. It added that direct conversations have been going on for some time between the French charges d'affaires at Bangkok, Thailand, and the Thai government, but said the mediation offer was accepted "in view of the existing friendly relations between France and Japan."

Suspended Sentences Given Flag Tearing
