SETUP FOR A "HOME GUARD"

According to Herschel Taylor and other Eugeneans who attended a conference at Salem between members of the American Legion and state officials, the American Legion is NOT asking for the immediate creation of a "Home Guard," as suggested in national defense plans, but only for the necessary authorization to prevent delay and confusion in creating such a guard if an acute emergency comes.

In other words the Legion's position is in line with that of Governor Sprague and General White and it is not asking for the immediate enlistment of the "Home Guard" as indicated in some of the reports from Salem. Since much of the work of the "Home Guard" would fall to the veterans of the last war, it is only fair that the veteran attitude should be understood.

Most of the veterans of the last war are men of middle age, men with business and family cares. They stand ready to put on uniforms, undergo drill and take up the active duty of safety patrols, but only if the situation shows a need, which as yet it does not. They are "not looking for trouble." They are not interested in "witch hunts." They are a body of men with military experience who can be very useful if there is any real trouble.

Nobody can predict what troubles the next few months might bring. Nobody knows the extent to which saboteurs and fifth columnists might become a real menace. It is merely prudent to have a plan for increased protection at home, if trouble comes. In the last war there was a vast amount of waste effort which cost this state alone more than \$500,000.

One plan which should be considered would be the expansion of the state police by assigning to it from time to time such carefully selected men from the "home guard" as the situation may warrant, special deputies to be under the command of the state police. Short of invasion or revolutionary rioting there is little need for a "home army." There may be great need for responsible men who can do well directed investigative and protective work.

At the time of the last war we had no state police as the nucleus for this kind of work. The "home guards" fell into army pattern; this really isn't needed. There will always be sufficient army units within call, if that type of armed force is required. Home guard duty is bound to be, in the main, an extension of police work.

We suggest this plan for legislative thought. Most of the veterans have no desire to spend valuable hours re-learning "by the numbers." Most of them are far more valuable to defense in their regular jobs. We suggest building Oregon's home guard around the state police.

WEST IS THE LAND OF HOPE

The great American West is still the land of hope, and Dan E. Clark, II, director of the pool known as "Front Door Ballot Box" has some interesting data to prove it. During the last campaign Mr. Clark conducted his poll for leading newspapers in Portland, San Francisco and the Los Angeles area on the Pacific Coast and in the East he operated in Baltimore, Philadelphia and Pittsburgh. Among the questions were these, designed to ascertain the "attitude" of the average citizen toward life and the problems of a competitive civilization:

If you could have your choice, would you elect:
 (a) A job with a living wage, no chance for advancement, but guaranteed security, or
 (b) A job with unlimited chances for advancement, but at the same time the risk of losing out, ending up with nothing.

In the Eastern cities the answers ran preponderantly in favor of the job with limited compensation, but complete security. Among people who said they were voting for Roosevelt better than three-fourths elected SECURITY over OPPORTUNITY, although there was a somewhat more optimistic showing among those who said they were voting for Wilkie where the majority favored OPPORTUNITY although not enough of them to offset the prevailing sentiment for SECURITY.

In the Pacific Coast cities, a heavy majority, regardless of their presidential notions, voted for the job with OPPORTUNITY and hang the risks of failure.

Mr. Clark thinks these figures mean something and so do we. Perhaps, as his plan of testing public opinion expands to nation-wide coverage, he will be able to throw considerable light on the attitudes in various

parts of this country, and perhaps on the reasons for those attitudes.

Young Clark himself is a pretty good specimen of the western spirit of enterprise. A few years ago he was graduated from the University of Oregon and spent most of his time knocking on editors' doors and asking for a job. Then he took some statistical courses at Stanford and created a job for himself. His "poll" is a variation, and probably an improvement on some of the other polls and has found a ready market not only with newspapers but with other industries.

If Clark had happened to grow up in Pennsylvania instead of in Oregon, would he have had so much initiative or would his ambition and his outlook and his courage been blanketed by Eastern "defeatism" (if it should be called that)? Would he have settled down in the "content" bracket, if on graduation he had landed the kind of job he then thought he wanted?

There are many interesting speculations on this theme.

Since both East and West returned heavy majorities for Mr. Roosevelt, does it follow that most of those who voted for him in the East did so because he represented SECURITY, while his followers in the West had OPPORTUNITY in mind?

Is the East settling down into what Spengler has called the "megalopolitan" condition of decay? Granting that OPPORTUNITY should not be allowed to run riot into PRIVILEGE for the strong, is not OPPORTUNITY rather than SECURITY the real American aim?

ALBANIAN ALEXANDER

One of the minor reasons why we don't want to see the totalitarians take over the entire world is that we would have to learn over again everything we thought we knew.

For instance, we were taught that Alexander the Great was a Greek, king of Macedonia. But the Italian newspaper Il Piccolo recently squeaked this musical note: Alexander was really a pure Albanian and no relation at all to the Greeks who have been manhandling the Italians of today.

Not long ago the Italians were protesting their complete Aryanism. The Germans alternately proclaim that British courage is the result of their pure Aryanism and that British failure is due to degeneration of the breed (according to how the war happens to be going at the moment).

Isn't the war bad enough in itself, without pouring over it all these double helpings of mental mush?

Italian authorities insist the situation behind their lines in Albania is satisfactory. It's okay with the Greeks in front of their lines, too.

WASHINGTON LETTER

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 28.—TAKING a leaf from the administration's desire to run the electric power of the nation, a bill has been introduced for the government to acquire and operate the steel and iron industry. Sponsor for the measure is Rep. Usher L. Burdick, Republican, of North Dakota. No administration support is yet forthcoming, however, and Burdick is operating on "his own" at least for the time being.

Mr. Burdick is very earnest about his plan for government ownership of steel. His argument is that steel is vital to the national defense program and that a few companies have a monopoly on all orders for the metal. Under the defense program, he points out, the profits in the past few months have been tremendous and will be greater in the immediate future.

It was the steel industry which first held up the program. The mills have a backlog and when the government wished them to expand to take care of the new business there was a protest. One company has since increased its facilities, although grudgingly. If a small group of mills are to dominate the situation, contends Mr. Burdick, the smart thing for Uncle Sam to do is to step in and take them over.

OPPONENTS of the lend-lease measure are scouting around for additional prominent citizens to appear before the senate committee on foreign relations and they hope to induce Henry Woodring, former secretary of war, to appear. Mr. Woodring was asked for his resignation very bluntly and he wrote a letter so sharp to the president that it has never been published. Mr. Woodring was succeeded as secretary of war by Henry L. Stimson, Republican, who was and is all for war. In a statement to the press on his being kicked out of office Mr. Woodring said: "I am an advocate of adequate defense but I will never stand for sending American boys into Europe's shambles. There is a comparatively small clique of international financiers who want the United States to declare war and get into the European mess with everything we have, including our manpower."

Beyond this explanation Mr. Woodring said nothing; retired to Kansas, where he was a governor before coming to Washington and a cabinet position. The anti lend-lease senators believe that Mr. Woodring, in view of that statement, could throw more light on the affair. The former secretary, however, has thus far maintained silence.

SENATOR Charles L. McNary, Oregon, was on a train coming to the national capital when the third inaugural was in progress. Accompanied by Mrs. McNary and little daughter, Charlotte, the senator left California where he was recuperating after his attack of pneumonia at Salem, and did not arrive in time for the celebration. His running mate, Wendell Wilkie, called upon the president before leaving for England. Mr. Wilkie, as a matter of precaution, received shots for typhus and small pox before taking the ship.

There is a mountain of correspondence and detailed reports on the senator's desk and it will be several days before he begins to see daylight. Upon his arrival various senators held conference with him on the one big issue before congress—the lend-lease measure, and a message from the White House invited him to "come down."
