Morse Releases 2 Labor Rulings

Registered daily workers of the ship clerks' union of San Francisco are not entitled to vacation with pay unless they have worked at least 70 per cent of the work hours per year permissible under the contract with the Waterfront Employers' association, it was ruled here today by Wayne L. Morse, dean of the University of Oregon law school and court arbitrator for maritime labor.

The dean thus rejected a contention made by the union that it should obtain vacations of less than a week for men who worked less than 70 per cent of permissible hours. He pointed out that the 70 per cent plan had been accepted, and the union's claim if allowed would re-open the issue already definitely settled.

In a second decision the arbitrator ruled that in computing the wage scale for vacations daily workers should receive pay on the basis of 40 per cent, and supervisors \$44, the wage they would receive for a full normal work week. Employers had asked that the computation be based on a 37-hour week and \$37 pay. It was pointed out that when work was available the 44-hour week is sanctioned by the fair labor standards act.

Willkie Sees Banners Of Protesting Mob

LONDON, Jan. 29.—(AP)—Sixty women flaunting banners protesting the government's food policy staged a demonstration in the Savoy hotel lobby today as Wendell L. Willkie arrived for lunch.

Earlier Willkie had intimated strongly that he would advocate Anglo-American financial cooperation in the war when he returned to the United States.

During the Savoy hotel lobby demonstration the demonstrators chanted:

"More food for workers."
"Why should the poor starve when the rich get all they need?"

Willkie arrived just before the demonstration got into full swing. He passed the demonstrators with hardly a glance.

After the women had refused the verbal plea of a burly policeman to leave peacefully some of them were ejected bodily by a dozen of the toughest members of the Savoy staff.

One of the banners carried in the demonstration was inscribed: "The government says to eat less but the rich get their fill."

Another was inscribed: "Ration the rich."

Stream Pollution Discussed At Lions

One of the greatest problems in the development of the northwest lies right in Lane county and adjacent areas in taking up the question of stream pollution and saving of fish life, commented Kenneth Tobias in a talk for the Lions club Wednesday. Mr. Tobias has made a study of stream pollution and the problems confronted in saving fish life.

Industrial waste, more than human waste, affects the waters, he said, pointing out the first big influx from industrial pollution into the Willamette is at Eugene. He said he was representing no group but was speaking as an individual who wished to see his son enjoy some of the fishing he himself had enjoyed in former days. In addition to the sportsmen, there are the commercial fishing interests to consider, these interests meaning millions of dollars to Oregon annually, he added.

The speaker quoted figures on studies made on the Willamette throughout its course to point out that trout and salmon can not exist in such polluted waters as exist on north of here.

Mr. Tobias briefly discussed moves for sewage disposal plants and the plans for building the high dams on the Willamette and its tributaries. In commenting on the plan for the dams he said he believed there were some flaws in that program, and reminded his listeners that unless there are freshets to wash out the rivers, there will be no spring run of salmon, adding the fall run into the Willamette and McKenzie already is a thing of the past. The speaker also commented that the recent resolution of the Wildlife Federation set forth the need for further study on this problem. The speaker was introduced by Carl R. Baker.

Robert Phillips was introduced as a new member, the club having increased its membership by four the past month, others joining the group including John Snellstrom, Edward F. Bailey and Hale G. Thompson.

Next week, the club is meeting Monday noon at the Eugene hotel to welcome Karl M. Sorrick, Lions International president, of Michigan. Because of the Monday meeting, no club meeting will be held on the regular day, Wednesday.
