W. S. C. Tops League In Shooting—309

A total of 57 players have made 1573 attempts to score field goals and have connected 437 times in the 14 northern division conference basketball games played through January 25, according to the official scoring figures compiled by the University of Oregon athletic news bureau.

Washington State college, with 125 goals in 404 attempts, has the best field goal "batting average," .309. Next is Oregon State, with 72 goals in 242 attempts, for .298. Washington has "hit" for a .282 percentage, Idaho .257 and Oregon .248.

Oregon leads in freethrow accuracy with 70 conversions in 107 attempts, a percentage of .654. Idaho is a close second with a .629 percentage.

Washington State also leads in average points per game, with an average of 43.7 in seven games. Oregon State has had the most fouls charged against it per game, 14.6.
