

Hitler Warns U. S. Against Convoys

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is highly mobilized and full of fight.

"As regards Italy, let no one invent revolutions in Milan, but let them rather look out so there will not be revolutions in their own countries."

"Whenever we can strike at England we shall strike. Neither here nor in Italy can anybody scare anybody with his inventions. We will settle scores, square mile for square mile, the Duce and I are neither Jews nor mongers."

"Wherever England puts in an appearance, we will attack her and we are strong enough to do so."

"Perhaps they are hoping for other states they can drag in. I do not know, but you who know me will realize that every contingency has, in a matter-of-fact manner, been calculated."

"Perhaps they (the British) are counting on hunger. We have organized our life rationally. There never will be hunger and no lack of raw materials."

Failure Cited

"They undertook an idiotic attempt to bring a cleavage between the Duce and the Italian people. Another lord might come and try to separate me from the German people; others have tried that and failed."

"This generation is full of fight. Blow for blow we will return and if the world were full of devils we would succeed anyway."

"One English statesman figures out I have made seven mistakes in the past year. I checked up and found I had made 724 mistakes, but my enemies 4,385,000."

There was laughter at this juncture.

"We are entering upon a new year with the defense force equipped as never before in German history."

"We are working ceaselessly on improvements. This spring the U-boat fight will begin. It will show we have not been asleep."

"The air force will properly continue to introduce itself. Our production continues. What others are planning is already a reality with us."

Big Year

"This will be the historical year of the new order in Europe. Tyranny will be abolished. The world will be open to all. The foundations for real understanding of peoples will be laid."

"My prediction of September, 1939, will come true: that the Jews' role is ended. People after people are sharing our racial conceptions. There will be a front of aryan humanity against international Jewish profiteers."

"Let our prayers be that God grant us victory this year."

With those words the man on whom the late President Paul von Hindenburg conferred the chancellorship just eight years ago today finished his address.

Hitler devoted 25 minutes of his speech to an attack on the British empire, which he called the product of 300 years of robbery and Britain herself the most "anti-social" state in the world—a "paradise for a few, continuous misery for the masses."

Church Women Plan Toy Loan Library

A toy loan library, where children may borrow games, dolls and other toys, is being planned by the Eugene council of church women. Children from two to 16 years may borrow a toy from the library for a seven or 14-day period. If it is returned late or shows improper use, the borrower is deprived of the loan of a toy for a short period. If it is returned in good condition, the borrower is allowed to choose from better toys.

The council needs a suitable place in which to establish a library. Anyone who can contribute the use of a room is asked to notify the secretary, Mrs. Henry Burch. Contributions of toys in good condition or which can be reconditioned are also solicited. Anyone having toys to donate may call Mrs. A. C. Bouck, 1786 Columbia, phone 2819-J.

Gage Speaker At Realty Board Meet

Evaluation as the basis of the real estate business was discussed by Dr. Daniel D. Gage, Jr., of the University of Oregon school of business faculty Thursday noon for the Eugene Realty board meeting at McCrady's cafe. Proper evaluation is the major consideration for making success of real estate business, the speaker said. Quality or value has to be there, he said. After comparing sale of real estate with the sale of other commodities and pointing out the differences in the situations, Dr. Gage commented that there is need to supplement to native knowledge about property a regular and orderly procedure to make the evaluation an authoritative one.

His talk was the first in the series of educational programs planned by the realtors during the coming year in their studies of service to members of the board and of service to the community.
