Higher Education Enrollment Declines 3 Per Cent From 1940

Total enrollment for spring term at the six institutional units of the Oregon state system of higher education show a three per cent decline, in comparison with the same period last year, according to figures released today by the office of Chancellor Frederick M. Hunter.

Dr. Hunter points out that the loss in enrollment is due primarily to loss of men due to the call to military service and to work in defense industries. The number of men enrolled at Oregon State college have decreased five per cent, and at the University of Oregon two per cent. Inclined to balance this decline is the fact that at both Oregon State college and at the University of Oregon enrollment of women has increased three per cent over last year.

Eastern Oregon College of Education, where a nine per cent increase is shown, is the only school in the system which has a greater enrollment this year. Southern Oregon College of Education and Oregon College of Education show the most sizeable declines in registered students.

Former Eugene Woman Dies In Gary, Indiana

Mrs. Hazel (Peggy) McNair Hayden, graduate of the University of Oregon in 1911 and a resi-

dent of Eugene for about 15 years, died Saturday, May 10, at Gary, Ind., at the age of 52. She was born July 25, 1888, in Florence, Wis., and lived in Tillamook for 22 years. She was the daughter of Alexander and Almada Jane McNair, Tillamook pioneers.

After leaving the University, she married Elmer Paine of Eugene. After his death, she married Lt. Col. Chauncey Harold Hayden. She is survived by the widow; a daughter, Mrs. William P. Hutchison (Jean Paine Hutchison) of Portland; a son, Dewey Paine of San Francisco; a sister, Mrs. Blanche M. Bellinger of Portland.

Mrs. Hayden was a member of Kappa Alpha Theta sorority and the Oregon Audubon society. Funeral services will be held Friday at 2:30 p. m. from Edward Holman and Son, Inc., Portland. Interment will be in Lincoln Memorial park.

School On Wheat Plan Is Conducted

A. N. Bodtker, state field man for the AAA, was in Eugene Tuesday to conduct a school on the federal wheat marketing quota program. O. S. Fletcher, county agent, and members of the staff of the county agricultural conservation association, co-operated and John Shepherd, of Scio, member of the state committee, was also here. The school was for community committee men of the county.

The general wheat situation will be discussed at a series of meetings of committeemen from the 12 communities in the county, starting May 19.

Peter Nelson Given Contract For Repair Of City Sidewalks

Contract for the repair of sidewalks in the city's business district has been awarded Peter A. Nelson, City Engineer W. C. Clubb announced Tuesday.

About 40,000 square feet of walk will be repaired, 37,000 feet of this in the business district and the rest in the southeast section of town which the WPA crews did not reach before this project was discontinued.

Cost of the repairs will be approximately \$8,400. The work is to be started this week but no time limit for completion has been set.

Archie Zarewski Named President Of New Club

Archie Zarewski, who is now working in Seattle, was elected president of a recently organized Phalanx club at Central Y.M.C.A. in that city. Another member of the group is Dick Hogan, also of Eugene.

The Seattle group recently went to Vancouver, B. C., for an induction ceremony. Mr. Zarewski reported that they were required to take out permits stating that they were United States citizens, and saying how long they intended to be in Canada. On their return, they were stopped twice, once for

baggage inspection by Canadian officials, and once by United States officials.
Mr. Zarewski is expected in Eugene this week-end. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Zarewski of Eugene, an dis employed by Boeing in Seattle.

Plan To Seed Grant Lands Set On Foot

A project to seed burned over and cut over tracts in the O and C grant lands in western Oregon was set on foot at a meeting of the executive committee of the grant lands association in Portland Monday. Walter Holland, Lane county commissioner, who is a member of the committee, attended the meeting.

Details of the program have not yet been worked out but the suggestion was made that as a means of financing it each county could contribute a certain amount from its share of federal funds it receives each year. Then, the state and government probably would be asked to help. The purpose of the plan is to furnish pasture on these lands for livestock.
