Peace Rumors Called German Propaganda

that Britain's position in the Middle East was grave. Once more a clamor was made for decisive action to beat Hitler's blitz legions to the punch.

Britain's former war secretary Leslie Hore-Belisha, in a speech bitterly assailing Prime Minister Churchill's conduct of the war, told an audience in Edinburgh, Scotland:

"We must win this war and we will back any government that will go all out to win it. We must realize, however, that you cannot win a 1914 war at a 1914 pace. We suffer defeat after defeat, and always for the same reason—lack of appreciation, lack of preparation and imperfect execution of the project. Each reverse is glossed over... and the narcotic of false confidence in the future is invariably applied."

Hore-Belisha proposed recognition of common citizenship by Great Britain and the United States as the "most hopeful assurance of the determination of the democracies to establish a new order."

Invitation
In the western hemisphere, Argentina invited the military leaders of seven American nations, including the United States, to tour her defense establishments, indicating thereby that she had abandoned her lukewarm attitude toward intercontinental defense.

Bolivia, Brazil, Chile, Paraguay, Peru, Uruguay and the United States were asked to send delegations, headed if possible by their

war ministers, on July 9, when Argentina celebrates the 125th anniversary of her independence from Spain.

In the western air war, London had its first daylight air-raid alarm since April 22. It lasted half an hour, while a small formation of Nazi planes flew over, wheeled and returned south. There were no reports that bombs had been dropped.

German aerial activity last night was confined to a light raid by a few planes on parts of Scotland.

Three Navy Fliers Die In Collision

SAN DIEGO, Cal., June 6.—(P)

The navy reported today that three fliers were killed and one injured in a mid-air collision of two planes from the heavy cruiser Chester near San Clemente island.

Naval authorities said the accident occurred late yesterday. The injured man was brought to the naval hospital here.

The deaths brought to 24 the number of naval aviation men who have died since Jan. 1 in accidents involving San Diego-based planes.

The planes apparently were torpedo bombers. The bodies were recovered and brought to a mortuary here.

Paul J. Burroughs, 20, radioman third class, Albion, Iowa.

Otto H. Wilkenning, 25, radioman, first class, Nebraska.

Ensign Jack R. Egan, who was rescued, was reported in a serious condition.

Senate Group O. K.'s Selective Service Act Amendment

WASHINGTON, June 6.—(P)

The senate military affairs committee approved an amendment to the selective service act today authorizing the president to defer the induction into the army of draftees who have reached their twenty-eighth birthday.

Originally the bill drafted by the selective service bureau would have given the president authority to defer service at any age he deemed wise instead of fixing an age.

The effect of the legislation, as drafted, would be to permit the president to exercise his discretion to order the deferment of service of draftees as each reached his twenty-eighth birthday.

No provision was made to excuse from service men over 27 years old who already have been inducted into the armed forces under the selective service act.

Argentina To Show Defense Facilities

BUENOS AIRES, June 6.—(P)

Argentina apparently abandoned today her lukewarm attitude toward intercontinental defense by inviting military leaders of seven American nations, including the United States, to tour her defense establishments.

Brazil, Paraguay, Uruguay, Bolivia, Chile, Peru and the United States, to tour her defense establishments.

It would be the first time since 1936, when the inter-American peace conference proposed by President Roosevelt was held here, that so many high-ranking leaders of the western hemisphere gathered in Argentina.

Chinese Suffocate During Air Attack

CHUNGKING, China, June 6.—(P)—Many Chinese suffocated in a large underground shelter last night during a five-hour Japanese air raid on this provisional Chinese capital.

Authorities banned publication immediately of the number of dead. There was no explanation how so many persons could have been overcome.

Dr. Bennett testified that he took the hammer, wrapped in a newspaper, to the court room to defend himself against a process server employed by Mrs. Chivers. He asserted the man had attacked him previously.

While he was swinging the hammer in self-defense, he added, Mrs. Chivers walked into a blow. Dr. Bennett and Mrs. Chivers had been engaged in litigation over the care of the educator's aged mother.

Vichy Answers Secretary Hull

VICHY, Unoccupied France, June 6.—(P)—An official French note issued by the foreign office spokesman tonight in answer to U. S. Secretary of State Hull's declaration against French cooperation with Germany said Washington misunderstood France's needs in a difficult situation.

"The French government for its part wants to preserve friendly relations with the United States, but the federal government cannot understand that the first task of the French government, in the particularly difficult situation in

which it finds itself, is to guard the vital interests of France," the statement said.
