

Oakridge Power Lines Progress

OAKRIDGE, June 6.—(Special)—The city council met the first of the week with representatives of the Lane County Cooperative Electrical company. They were here to get permission from the city to put up poles and lines in Oakridge. The city attorney was instructed to meet with the company attorney and draw up an agreement. The company is working on the lines between Oakridge and Eugene and expects to have the line completed by fall. The city is putting in an out-of-doors emergency telephone on the Clark building on the highway. The phone is to be used only in case of fire, accident or an emergency.

Eugene High Graduates Urged to "Think Straight"

A challenge to "think straight" so that "you can help in bringing our civilization out of its present peril" was flung to the graduates of Eugene high school by George W. Rochester, of the University school of law, at their annual commencement exercises Thursday night at McArthur court.

"The failure to think straight has brought the world to its present state where not a single power is able at this moment to stop the march of the barbarians—where want exists in the midst of plenty—and when democracy is receiving its greatest challenge."

This straight thinking must be based on two fundamental points, the speaker declared:

(1) The realization that no individual, no group can live unto itself alone in the future, and

(2) The old idea of patriotism "my country may she always be right—but my country right or wrong" must be changed to a defense of the right wherever it is found.

"You are one of a team," the graduates were told, "don't try to play the game by yourself."

Highlight of the evening's program for the parents and friends in the audience was the presentation of diplomas for which the 284 seniors marched to the stage to receive their certificates from the

hand of G. D. MacLaren, chairman of the school board. The seniors then joined in singing their Alma Mater song and three loud cheers for the school.

Music was provided both by the orchestra under the direction of Douglas Orme and the a cappella choir directed by Glenn Griffith. The orchestra played the processional and "Finlandia" by Sibelius, while the choir sang four numbers: "Beautiful Savior," by Christian; "Madam Jeanette," by Murray; "Oregon Trail," by DeRose; and "Song of Farewell" by Kountz which is traditional with Eugene high graduating classes. Miss Enid Smith was the soloist for "Beautiful Savior."

Announcement of special awards to members of the graduating class were made on the program as follows: Jane Thacher cup for excellence in band, John Kienzie; Earl Jones cup for excellence in athletics, Raymond Blatchley; board of higher education scholarships to University of Oregon, Miss Doris Fassett and Robert Gilmore; scholarship to Mills college, Miss Katherine Malory; and Mu Phi Epsilon, women's music honorary, awards to the Misses Shirley Baldwin, Jean Boals and Vera Fair.
