the American Declaration of Independence in 1776. Appropriate verses and other stage effects will be used to carry the continuity.

Final of this episode will be a dance utilizing almost the entire cast portraying the melting pot which is America.

Land Explored

Back again to Oregon the spectators then will be taken to watch the Exploration of the Land portrayed.

Five principal scenes will appear here—the life of the Indians, in which the theme of the Thunderbird and the impressive rain ceremonial dances will be outstanding; exploration from the west or the Ship Columbia scene in which the Gleemen will start; exploration from the east or the Lewis and Clark expedition; a large, colorful scene at Ft. Vancouver with McLoughlin in the leading role and the dances, sports and life in the fort to be shown; and finally a thrilling climax in which the advance scout of the pioneer wagon train is chased by Indians and escapes by jumping a "real" (Mrs. Smith promises) waterfall.

There is little need to describe the next episode—Entry into the Land—to Eugeneans who have seen or participated in the previous pageants. This will be the pioneer scene, the true climax of the show, in almost the same form as in previous years. The wagon trains will wind over the mountains, stop along the trail, form a stockade against Indian attacks and the pioneers will then dramatize typical activities of a night on the trail—cooking, eating, discipline, marriage, birth, death, washing clothes, singing and dancing, and finally sleep.

The finale is as yet a deep, dark secret, but it will contain in some way a tribute to this "deep desire" for freedom exemplified by the Pioneer. "You can tell them that there won't be an airplane," Mrs. Smith declared with a rueful grin.

Cherry Pickers Next Need of Employers

With the peak of the strawberry picking nearly over this week, Oregon's farm labor demand is fairly well supplied except for urgent need of cherry pickers in The Dalles area, according to a survey by the state employment service.

Growers around The Dalles are asking for 2,000 pickers for the coming week. Employment offices over the state are sending surplus help as far as possible.

Gathering the pea crop in Umatilla county also is attracting outside labor but so far no shortage has developed. About 5,000 pea pickers will be needed this month, it is reported.

Mild weather during May slowed up strawberry ripening and prevented a shortage of help, according to those responsible for placing the 25,000 pickers in the berry fields. While a few sections last portions of the crop during the recent warm spell, a major part was harvested.

guilds, which has replaced the chamber of deputies in the fascist regime, to meet in special session June 10, the first anniversary of Italy's entrance into the war.

Amidst all this behind-the-front activity, French-mandated Syria has become a precarious chip on both British and German shoulders, each belligerent waiting and preparing for the moment the other will knock it off.

A dominant factor in Britain's preparation, it was said in London Saturday night, was the speed with which American-made war equipment and materials reach the Middle East zone of battle.

American-made tanks already have been reported in battle near Tobruk where desegregated British forces harass the flank of a threatened axis drive on Suez from the west.

Lane USO Campaign At Half-Way Mark

Pleased at the early success of their campaign to raise \$4000 as Lane county's share of the nationwide United Service Organizations for National Defense, directors of the Lane U.S.O. committee had high hopes Saturday of completing their work within another week.

Contributions from Eugene alone are now over the \$2000 mark. It was reported Saturday by Chairman George J. Wilhelm, who pointed out that not all city workers have completed their assigned lists and that all communities outside of Eugene have yet to stage their campaigns.

Much yet remains to be done in Eugene itself, Mr. Wilhelm declared, and the downtown canvassing force of more than 50 men and a newly formed women's group numbering more than 150 plan to keep working through the next week.

Astronomer Pruett Writes—Of Vega and Harp of Orpheus

As the twilight turns into night during these June evenings, one can hardly fail to be attracted by a fine star high in the east and a trifle to the north. This is Vega, one of the brightest of the stars and the only one of its brilliance in this part of the early summer sky.

By the time the sky is dark, five dim stars become visible near Vega. With Vega they form the constellation Lyra.

To trace the constellation, start with Vega. Then note the two tiny stars, the nearest Vega of any seen. These two and Vega form a

small triangle. The northern of the faint ones is Epsilon Lyrae, the well known "double-double." Without optical aid, unusually keen eyes can often see this object as an elongated star. Even small opera glasses will show it as two well separated stars. With small telescopes each star of the pair is again broken into two, but very close together.

Now start with the southern of the small stars of our triangle. Almost below it is another little star. A little south and lower are two more, slightly brighter. The four make a distorted rectangular figure which, in the words of a little girl, looks like a "mashed box."

In classical mythology Lyra was the harp of Orpheus, the great musician. So charming was his music that it had power over wild beasts, drew stones and trees from the ground, and stopped rivers from flowing. The famed Argonautic expedition found Orpheus on board. When other ships passed the islands where the sirens sang their sweet songs and lured many to their death, the captains often tied their sailors to the masts, or poured wax in their ears. But on the Argo, Orpheus played his harp so beautifully that the alluring nymphs, despite their utmost effort, attracted no attention.

Vega is of special interest because, due to the slow precession of the equinoxes, it will be our north star in about 12,000 years from now. It is one of the nearer stars. The recent tables of Yale parallaxes indicates that only 27 years are required for its light to reach us.

Our present north star is now about one degree from the true pole of the sky. It will continue to get closer until 2095 A. D. when it will be one-half degree away. Then it will gradually get farther away and will not again be a good pole star for 26,000 years.

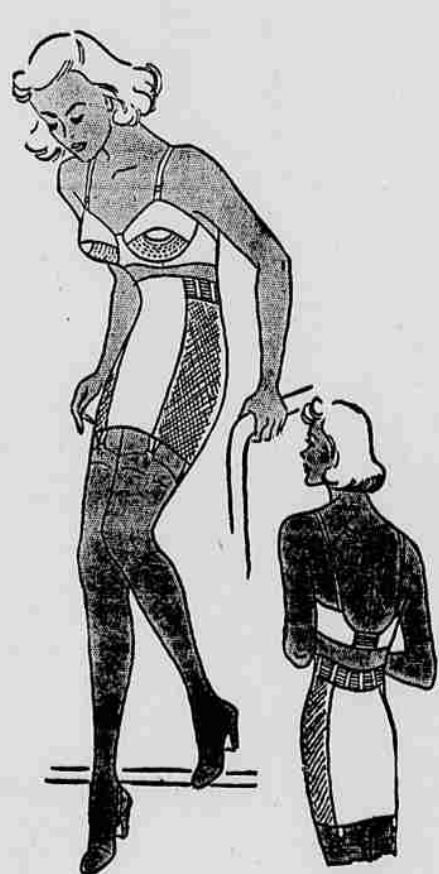
INJURED IN CRASH

250,000 4-H's to Help Step up Meat Output for Defense

The urgent need for greater production of meats this year to supply home and national defense requirements, as emphasized by governmental agencies, has brought nationwide response from 4-H club members. It is estimated that close to a quarter million rural youth will enroll in the 1941 livestock projects to help meet the need.

Enrollees in this state are eligible to share in the benefits of the national 4-H meat animal competition, in which they will have an exceptional opportunity to gain experience, as well as financial profit, in meat production. Last year's four sectional winners reported gross returns of their enterprises were \$24,618, and cash prizes on exhibits, \$3,247.

The competition will be conducted by county agents under the direction of the state extension service. Numerous rewards for outstanding achievements are provided by Thomas E. Wilson, Chicago packer, and chairman of the National Committee on Boys and Girls Club Work. Among the awards are gold medals for clubsters making the best county record, and a gold watch for the state winner. The highest scoring participant in this extension section will receive an all-expense trip to the 20th National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago next November and a \$200 agricultural college scholarship will be awarded to each of a blue award group of three selected from the four sectional winners.

Three Eugene high school girls, Shirley Baldwin, Jean Boals and Vera Fair, have been chosen to receive the Mu Phi Epsilon award for their achievements during the past year.
