

Bakery Open House New, Modern Plant

new modern bakery west of Eugene, one of the most progressive plants in the entire world will be open to the public for inspection Monday, when the Williams Co., invites the citizens to a week of open-house to celebrate the new plant.

The new bakery will be open to the public from 2:30 to 9 p. m. through Saturday, it is announced by B. T. Williams, president of the Williams Co., who is also expected to be at the bakery, with actual inspection of the building to be carried out during the week.

is constructed of reinforced concrete painted spotlessly white. The entire front of the building will be landscaped, according to Mr. Williams, with attractive shrubs and a beautiful garden features of the new plant.

The inside of the building has indirect lighting for all offices, air-conditioning throughout, controlled temperatures, hardwood maple floors, and tile walls, all designed for comfort of employees and durability as well.

Cost of the structure, which was built to keep in step with the most modern methods available to bakeries, was not disclosed, although estimates placed the figure in the neighborhood of \$40,000.

The newly-built bakery will be open for inspection by all, with refreshments to be served, hostesses available as guides and programs of entertainment to be offered. These will be in the nature of radio broadcasts directly from the bakery, from 8:15 to 8:30 each evening except Thursday, when the time will be 7:45 to 8 p. m.

Mr. Williams also announced that in conjunction with the opening of the modernistic bakery for inspection, prizes will be awarded to visitors writing 50 to 75 words on what part of the bakery impressed them most. These will be 10 in number and will include a toastmaster hospitality set, a mixer, a portable radio, a triple-headed Remington electric shaver, an electric fan, a floor lamp, an electric clock, an electric stove, modernistic coffee-maker, and an electric iron.
