Oil Company Employees
Honored For Safe Driving

John T. Foreman, local branch manager for Gilmore Oil company, along with five other Oregon division employees, was honored last week when ten-year gold watch awards were made by W. G. Julier, safety engineer, at the annual safe driving dinner in Portland. The watch awards were

made to employees who have operated their motor vehicles for ten consecutive years without being responsible for even a minor traffic mishap.

In addition to the ten-year safe drivers, three members of the Oregon personnel who had completed five consecutive years without an accident received the five-year gold plaque award together with a "safe driver dividend" check.

Foreman was highly complimented upon the outstanding record at the Eugene branch in that his operation has not experienced a single motor vehicle accident since its inception over ten years ago. Adding up the individual time for all employees at the local branch, they have accumulated a total of 21 years without accident.

The large number of five and ten consecutive year awards is all the more remarkable, points out Julier, when it is considered that every traffic mishap, even though it result in no more than a scratched fender, is recorded. The Gilmore executive stated that 62 employees of the Gilmore company were this month presented with ten-year gold watch awards while 25 received the five-year gold plaque.

To set up an even closer goal for all employees, including the newest members of the organization, a yearly reward of a bronze pocket piece is included in the safety program. Julier reports that there were 335 of these annual awards also distributed this month.
