

Turnouts Good For Dance Rehearsals

First rehearsals for both the older and younger dancers for the pageant had good turnouts Tuesday evening and Wednesday morning, according to Mrs. Mildred LeCompte Moore, dance director, but more dancers are still needed, particularly in some of the smaller specialty numbers.

A group of 130 girls over the age of 12 were present at the rehearsal Tuesday night at McArthur court for the creation of the land, glacier, and rivers dances, and about 75 more are needed. Rehearsals are each Tuesday and Thursday at 7 p. m.

About 65 west side children, 6-12, reported Wednesday morning at the St. Mary's school for the "fruits of the valley" dance. East side children will meet Thursday morning at Condon school at 10:15 for the "flowers of the valley" dance. These rehearsals will be held rain or shine. Mrs. Moore declared, the school auditoriums having been made available for inside work.

The "fruits" and "flowers" will do the same dances and wear the same costumes but the "flowers" will carry blossoms in blue, pink, lavender, red, yellow and orange. A boys' dance group was also started at St. Mary's and one will be organized at Condon.

Rehearsals for these two groups will be in the day time until the final week before the pageant. The dances, however, come at the very beginning of the show so the children can be home by 9 o'clock both the nights of dress rehearsals and the actual pageant, Mrs. Moore said.

Other dancers needed for the specialty numbers are: 12 boys or

young men for Indian dances—rehearsal Tuesdays and Thursdays at McArthur court at 7 p. m.; six boys or young men for the American colonial minuet—rehearsal at same times; 12 boys or young men for the French-Canadian Cree dance, rehearsals to be announced later; 75 girls for the waterfall dance and 50 for the smoke dance, (both in the creation prologue), rehearsals Tuesdays and Thursdays at 8 p. m.

Dancers are also needed for the melting pot episode, three for the Irish dance, seven for the Scotch, eight for the Italian, and four for the English dances. Rehearsals are at 7 o'clock Tuesday and Thursday evenings at McArthur court.

All adults who wish to be in the square dances of the pioneer episode are asked to sign up at pageant headquarters. The first rehearsal of this group will be July 10 at McArthur court at 8 p. m., with both callers and musicians.

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Pageant Chorus To Rehearse Monday

Organization of the Oregon Trail pageant chorus has been nearly completed and first rehearsal is to be held next Monday evening, according to Glenn Griffith, assistant chorus director. Enrollments have been received from 279 persons, including about 80 members of the Gleemen and Women's Choral groups. Place of the rehearsal will be announced later.

Registration for the chorus has not yet been closed, however, and any person who wishes to sing may still enroll, Mr. Griffith said.

At a meeting Tuesday evening of the leaders of the different phases of the pageant it was decided to have a seated chorus of about 100 members of the Gleemen and Women's choral groups, whose voices will be amplified. This group will be seated on the race track between the grandstands and the stage and just to one side of the symphonic band.

A pit is to be dug for the band in the front center of the stage. The remainder of the chorus will also be actors, moving about on the stage.

A number of familiar pageant songs will again be included in this year's show, according to Mr. Griffith, including the "Pale Moon" solo by Sacajawea, "Oh Susannah" by a young boy soloist and the chorus; "Turkey in the Straw" sung by the chorus to accompany the square dancers; "Land of Hope and Glory" as the pioneer wagon train winds upon the stage; "Battle Hymn of the Republic" in the final episode; and one of the favorites of the 1937 pageant, "Come, Come Ye Saints" by the Mormon choir.

A lush, colorful scene in which the Gleemen will star is that at Ft. Vancouver. Some of the solos and chorus numbers are "Bonnie Dundee," "Bendemeer's Stream," "Auld Lang Syne," "On, Roll On," and "Oh, Canada." Small groups of men singers will also appear in the Ship Columbia scene to sing "Blow My Bully Boy Blow," and the chorus is to sing "Stars and Stripes Forever."

Tryouts for the solo parts will be announced next week by Mr. Griffith. A number of other musical numbers are still in the process of selection.

Unemployment Tax Deadline June 30

Firms still owing state unemployment taxes for 1941 and employing eight or more workers can save 81 per cent of the federal excise tax by paying before June 30, an announcement received from Salem Wednesday reveals.

This offset will be allowed until June 30. After that date delinquent employers will be liable for the entire amount.

Prominent Doctors Will Speak Here

Doctors of Eugene and nearby areas will hear two prominent men of medicine lecture on obstetrics and surgical pediatrics in a one-day course here Tuesday, June 24. The Oregon State Medical society, in co-operation with the division of maternal and child health of the Oregon State board of health, is sponsoring the "refresher" lectures as a contribution to the maintenance of high medical standards.

Guest speakers will be Dr. William J. Diekmann, associate professor of obstetrics and gynecology at the University of Chicago, and Dr. Herbert E. Coe, pediatrics surgeon of Seattle.

More Bundles Sent To Aid Britain

Another shipment left Eugene Tuesday destined for England to "bring comfort and necessities to Great Britain at war." Mrs. Florence Evans, in charge of shipping for Bundles for Britain, said the eight big boxes weighed 416 pounds and were sent through the Portland branch where they will be loaded Thursday on a ship sailing for England.

Bundles for Britain chapters in Oregon and California were allowed 5000 pounds on this boat, and Oregon's share will be taken aboard at Portland, while California chapters will load their contributions when the boat docks at San Francisco.

The shipment included knitted garments, children's clothing, mostly new, and women's and men's used clothing.

During the absence of Mrs. Lillian Sherwin, who is on vacation, Mrs. Evans is being assisted in the shipping department of Bundles for Britain by Miss Cora Ten Eyck.

The boxes were taken to Portland by McCracken Brothers, who are contributing the freight to the cause.

125 Merchants Now Offering Queen Votes

Over three and one-half million queen's votes are now in the hands of merchants offering them as a bonus with purchases. It is announced by Richard C. Williams, assistant business manager of the Oregon Trail pageant.

Approximately 125 merchants have placards in their windows signifying they are cooperating with the Queen Susannah V contest committee by giving the votes.

Customers are reminded to ask for the votes wherever they buy anything, in order that they make their choice for queen.

Mr. Williams also announced that about four million votes have been issued in connection with the sales of decals and stamps publicizing the pageant.

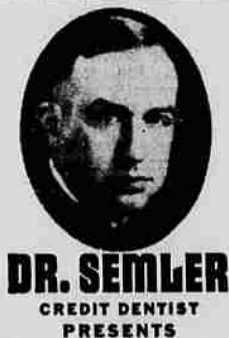
