

German-Turkish Pact Adds Weight To Nazi Pressure On Russia

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very shortly thereafter Turkey made it plain she would not fight unless attacked.

She kept her powder dry when Germany swept through the Balkans and as a result was almost completely isolated from Britain. Britain has been trying to unlock that isolation by her advance through Syria, but her progress has not been swift enough to counter the German pressure on Ankara.

Turkey, forced into the position of a little Russia, unwilling to take the risk of military destruction at a time when she could get little help, signed the pact in the hope of gaining time, praying that something may happen to upset the German war wagon before Hitler finds the time appropriate to ask or take something else from the Turkish.

Patrolman Kearney Called To Army

A leave of absence for Patrolman Leonard Kearney, ordered to report to the army June 30, will be acted on by the city council at its next meeting June 23.

Kearney, who has been with the force for the past four and a half years, requested the leave Wednesday after receiving order to report to the 20th radio intelligence company at Ft. Lewis, Wash., as a second lieutenant.

Action to replace the patrolman may be taken at the meeting by Mayor Elisha Large. Five men have taken the civil service examination for the police force, but their physical examinations have not yet been completed.

Other city employees who have been called to army duty are Recorder Cal Bryan, now serving as a first lieutenant, and Fireman Bob Johnston, now serving as a captain.

Trainees For Defense Jobs Get Deferment

A plan for deferment of individuals being trained for defense industries has been developed by the Oregon selective service system, the state employment service and the state board for vocational education, Dr. J. F. Cramer, superintendent of schools, announced Thursday.

Dr. Cramer's announcement came after he received a letter from O. I. Paulson, director of the vocational board. The deferment may apply to students now enrolled, or to those on the waiting list for classes. It would place the students in Class II-A, automatically deferring them for six months.

Students qualified by the nature of their classwork will fill out a certificate of vocational training for national defense which will be sent to their local boards, and the employment office.

Dr. Cramer also received authorization from Paulson to set up "refresher" classes for three hours a day, five days a week, in order to meet the needs of employed workers who can qualify for occupations essential to national defense.

These courses will be available to individuals now employed out of their trades.

Local Transfer Line Seeks Extension

Schaefer's Building To Be Repaired

The first permit to repair damage resulting from the big Newberry store fire last week was taken out Wednesday by the Schaefer Brothers for a \$1,000 repair job to their building at 892 Willamette.

The Schaefer's building was not badly damaged by the fire. Most of the work, to be done by Stien Brothers contracting firm, will be repair to the roof and repainting.

U. S. Invited To Sent Radiolocators To British Isles

Full details of the British device, which has played a prominent role in discouraging Nazi raids on England, have been turned over to the United States long since. American technical and military experts have made reciprocal contributions.

Funds Provided
Announcing the start of the British drive to enlist "at least" 13,000 skilled American civilians for a technical corps, Air Commodore George C. Pirie yesterday disclosed some of the details of the weapon against night fighters.

Congress included \$6,929,000 in defense funds for detectors to be installed in warning stations on the Atlantic, Gulf and Pacific coasts, and in Hawaii, Alaska, Puerto Rico and the Canal Zone. Plans also provided for five mo-

bile signal corps companies in addition. The detectors cost \$54,700 each.

The first of the mobile stations already is in operation, and received an initial service test last January in anti-aircraft war games in the New York area.

Herman E. Hector, 1556 Washington, died Wednesday while at work at the Pacific Telephone company, at the age of 55. He was born April 28, 1886, near Albany, and had lived in Eugene for the past six years.

He worked for the telephone company for 20 years, having been with the Home Telephone company for 11 years. He is a member of the Christian Science church. Mr. Hector is survived by his wife, Nellie; a son, Ralph D. of Palo Alto; a brother, Gilmore Hector; a sister, Miss Irene Hector, both of Albany.

Funeral services will be held at 2 p. m. Saturday from the Branstetter-Simon chapel, with interment at Rest Haven Memorial park.

Labor Shortage For Bean Crop Forecast

A drastic shortage of laborers for the approaching bean crop and other summer and fall crops was forecast Thursday by Donald F. Mattson, head of the agriculture labor division of the Eugene employment office.

Mattson based his prediction on the difficulty the office has encountered getting enough pickers for the light cherry crop. Despite a subnormal crop, about 50 to 60 per cent below last year, more

than 200 pickers are still needed. "We are going to have to recruit workers who have never participated in this type labor before," Mattson said. The employment of many workers in defense industries and centers has drained off much of the regular seasonal labor group, he added.

Maritime Commission Takes Italian Ship

WASHINGTON, June 19.—(AP)—The maritime commission announced today it had taken formal possession of the first of the 28 sabotaged Italian ships laid up in United States waters.

The commission said its representatives took possession of the ship Clara—8,131 gross tons—at Savannah, Ga., yesterday.

The Clara, the commission said, will be taken to Newport News, Va., for drydocking before being placed in service.

The commission said it had not been decided to what service the vessel would be assigned.

Least damaged of the 28 laid-up Italian vessels, the Clara already had been repaired at Savannah.

Fur Coat Styles Told By H. Gordon

Harry F. Gordon, of H. Gordon and Co., returned Wednesday from a week's trip to San Francisco where he attended the early market on fur coats, studying the fall style trends.

Price increases for Oriental mink and weasel, Russian kolinsky and muskrat coats are expected, but Persian lamb, kid carcass and squirrels will remain nearly the same. In the fabric market increases are expected in the imported materials. A tax may be placed on fur coats in August.

The 33-inch "fingertip length" coat is expected to be good this year and most of the coats are being shown with small collars. Fur jackets are also still good, Mr. Gordon reports.

All fabrics are to be labeled this year, in accordance with a new law. One hundred per cent woolen materials will be so marked and also those of cotton or rayon mixtures. Also specified will be whether the wools are virgin wool, re-worked or re-processed wool. These two latter terms, Mr. Gordon explains, are merely manufacturers' labels for the shorter wools not utilized in the first process. They do not indicate old materials or yarns. Both ready-made garments and yardage will be marked.
