

Archie Harris Breaks World Discus Throw Record

Les Steers Has Last Chance

Discus Mark Only One To Fall In NCAA Meet

PALO ALTO, Cal., June 21—(AP)—Girded for record shattering performances, 200 of the finest athletes in America ring down the curtain Saturday on the 1941 track and field season with the big meet of the year—the National Collegiate championships.

With one world mark already placed in the discard in Friday's qualifying trials—a tremendous discus throw by Indiana's negro star, Archie Harris—today's finals brought together representatives from 53 schools in Stanford university's great sports stadium.

Harris' mighty effort with the heavy platter measured 174 feet 8 1/2 inches. The recognized world record is held by Germany's Willi Schroeder—174 feet 2 1/2 inches, set in 1935.

Spectacular as Harris' achievement was, more thrills were expected today. Champions back to defend their 1940 laurels were Norwood Ewell of Penn State, the 1940 sprint king; Indiana's Campbell Kane in the 880; Al Blozis of Georgetown in the shot put; California's Martin Biles in the javelin; Johnny Wilson of U. S. C., co-champion in the high jump; and Harris, given another chance to outdo his own efforts of the trials Friday.

Center of attention in the high jump was Les Steers of Oregon, the lad who startled the sports world with a leap of 6 feet 11 inches last Tuesday and who hoped to reach the seven-foot mark today.

Opening attraction in the track events was the mile, with Leslie MacMitchell of New York university a standout. Kane was seen as his closest rival.

The quarter-mile run promised another battle, pitting Grover Klemmer of California against a field that included Hubert Kerns of U. S. C., Bill Lyda of Oklahoma, Bob Smith of Washington, Harold Bogrow of New York U., Gene Littler of Nebraska and others.

Washington Crew Coach Pessimistic

FOUGHKEEPSIE, N. Y., June 21—(AP)—Most of the crews assembled on the banks of the Hudson were eased up in preparation for final time trials over the weekend, but Al Ubricksen, coach of the Washington Huskies, sent his varsity and junior varsity eights over the full course for the last time before the regatta Wednesday.

Ubricksen clobbered his varsity boat for the four miles in 19:48 and the jayvee shell for three miles in 15:02, and he expressed concern over the former.

"They need more conditioning," he said. "I knew they would not reach their peak because we had such bad weather in Seattle before coming East, but I never dreamed they would look as ragged as they did today. However, I'm quite satisfied with the junior boat."

The Huskies suffered their first casualty today when Doyle Fowler, No. 4 varsity oarsman, came in after a short afternoon spin with a sore throat and slight cold.

If Fowler is unable to row on Wednesday, Ubricksen would use Bill Sauer or Hi Leinenweber, his J. V. No. 4 and 6. Alternate Christofferson would then come up to fill in the vacancy in the second shell.

"If that happens, we don't do any winning on Wednesday," Ubricksen commented.

To counteract Ubricksen's pessimism, Coach Ky Ebricht of California said that the Huskies looked even better than they did in licking the Bears by three lengths earlier in the year. "Just wait till you see them on Wednesday," he advised.

Yanks Trounce Detroit, 14-4

DiMaggio Hits Safety In 33rd Straight Game

If the New York Yankees never had had their super-teams of super-stars—Ruth, Gehrig, Gomez, Lazzari and the rest—this year's club might be called great.

Fans often get excited over teams nowhere near as powerful as the present Yankees, who are handicapped in gaining recognition because the memory of exploits of their marvelous predecessors lingers.

Yet the way the Bombers are blasting in the American league right now, there is a possibility they will become another scourge.

The Yankees are in second place, to be sure, but they have beaten the pace setting Cleveland Indians seven times in 10 games and didn't really get rolling until recently.

They have won 10 of their past 12 games and looked impressive in doing it. In 16 consecutive games they have walloped 27 home runs. Joe DiMaggio has hit safely in 33 straight contests, matching the great streak of Rogers Hornsby in 1922 in the National league.

Charley "King Kong" Keller has hit a home run in each of the past four games.

This was the sort of slugging the Yankees threw at the Detroit Tigers Friday for a 14-4 victory. DiMaggio collected four hits.

Cleveland was beaten 7-6, by the lowly Washington Senators in a loose game that included 30 hits and three errors.

Jeff Heath made four hits for the second straight day and the Indians rallied for three runs in the ninth inning to tie the score, but the Senators punched across the winning run in their half when George Archie singled, stole second, and raced home on a single by Buddy Lewis.

The Brooklyn Dodgers improved their position in the National league by clipping the Cincinnati Reds, 6-2, behind the three-hit pitching of chubby Hugh Casey.

The New York Giants scored five runs in the eighth inning of a night game at St. Louis to beat the Cardinals, 6-2, and cut their first place margin to two games.

Lefty Larry French pitched four-hit ball to bring the Chicago Cubs a 5-0 shutout over the Boston Braves.

The Philadelphia Phillies, who lost a big lead and their ball game to the Cardinals Thursday, repeated the same trick against the Pittsburgh Pirates Friday. A three-run homer by Nick Etten in the seventh gave the Phils a 6-2 lead. But the Pirates scored four times in their half of the seventh and won, 7-6.

A's Meet Medford In Two-Game Series

The Eugene Athletics travel to Medford today for a two game series with the Medford Craters. A game tonight will be an exhibition affair with a Sunday afternoon game to count in league standings.

The A's are fourth in league standings at present with two wins and one loss. They are still in the running for the pennant since every team in the league has been beaten at least once. The loop was thrown into a five team race last week when the Bend Elks upset the previously undefeated Albany Alcos.

Albany and Klamath Falls are tied for the league lead with four wins and one loss. Bend is next with three and one and Eugene next with two and one. Silerton has won one and lost one.

Hills Creek and Medford have each won one and lost three and Toledo has yet to win a game and has lost five.

Either Pete Igoe or Bob Wiltshire will be the starter for Eugene Sunday with Al Linn and Hal Ankerberg in line for chucking duty in the exhibition game tonight.

Nova Signed For Louis

NEW YORK, June 21—(AP)—Lou Nova, California collegian, Saturday was signed by Promoter Mike Jacobs to meet Champion Joe Louis for the heavyweight boxing title in September.

The site and date will be announced later. Jacobs, in selecting Nova from a long list of challengers, including Billy Conn, pointed out that Lou was the only one of the group that had not had a shot at the title.

Nova staged a great comeback to qualify for the title shot after a year away from the ring because of illness following his defeat by Tony Galento in September, 1939. The Californian returned to competition last fall and after a warm-up bout or so, punched Pat Comiskey all over the ring to win a ten-round decision in Madison Square Garden last January and then knocked out Max Baer for the second time in the eighth round of their April engagement in the Garden.

Ray Carlen, Nova's manager, said Lou would leave soon for the Maine woods, where he will spend several weeks in preliminary training. Louis, showing signs of staleness in knocking out Conn in the 13th round last Wednesday, will take things easy for the next two months.
