Eugene Athletics travel to Toledo Sunday to open their second half schedule against the Mud Hens. Tuesday night the Athletics will play the Palmer House Stars in a game that will give local fans a chance to look at some of the nation's top colored players. A postponed game will be played at Wednesday night.

Palmer House team is made up of stars from negro organized baseball and has been the state champion for the past two years and last year won the national colored semi-pro championship at the semi-pro tournament at Wichita, Kansas.

Jack Marshall, Palmer House shortstop, was picked as the best shortstop in the semi-pro tourney last year and Manager Alex R. Radcliff was runner-up for the tournament batting championship with an average of .487.

Stars to watch in the Palmer House lineup include "Steel Arm" Davis, first baseman who was for years the leading hitter in the

negro National league. Left fielder John Bissant runs the hundred yard dash in less than 10 seconds and last year stole 78 bases in 110 games.

The probable lineup for the Palmer House team is: Bissant, shortstop; Shirley Petway, catcher; Radcliff, first base; Petway is a former Giants and Petway is a former Detroit Star. "Steel Arm" Davis will be at first and Bernell Long, formerly with the St. Louis Blues will be on second. Marshall will hold down his regular shortstop position and Manager Alex

Radcliff will be on third. The outfield will be picked from John Bissant, Ducky Davenport, Bilbo Williams and "Putt" Powell.

Bissant and Powell are both former American Giants. Williams is an ex-St. Louis Blues player and Davenport was with the Memphis Red Sox.

Pete Reiser of the Brooklyn Dodgers continued to lead the National league with .356, but there were no fewer than five batters in the American league above this figure.

The week's important hitting development in the latter circuit was the spurt of Roy Cullenbine of the St. Louis Browns, who inflated his average 23 points to .360. The rise lifted him into third place in the American league, 17 points behind the steady slugging of Cleveland's Jeff Heath.

Reiser dropped 10 points in the National league race and was threatened by Johnny Mize of the St. Louis Cardinals, who pumped his batting up 11 points to .353.
