"The Religious Basis of Democracy" will be the subject of an address at the Community Liberal church (Unitarian) Sunday evening at eight o'clock by Dr. Hugh Miller of the University of California at Los Angeles. Dr. Miller believes that the modern conception of democracy is a development of the struggle for religious freedom, and will shortly publish a book developing this thesis.

Dr. Miller was studying at the University of Berlin when the war broke out in 1914 and spent four years in German prison camps. Discussion will follow the address. The public is invited.

Sheet Metal Classes Train Plane Workers

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approximately 460 students have been enrolled. Of these 140 are still in class, with a concrete part in the defense program as an aircraft worker soon to be theirs.

More than 225 are already working in factories. Sixty more have obtained employment in allied industries or in jobs where their training has been of value. Only about 40 of the 460 have failed to gain through the course.

Of the students employed, approximately 100 are at Boeing; about 70 more at Lockheed, with 50 of the present class tested and waiting to go to work as soon as a new plant is completed; 40 are at the Columbia plant in Oregon; and a dozen more are working in the Consolidated and Douglas factories.

Thousands More Needed Almost all of these factories have expansion programs underway which will call for thousands of new workers within the coming months.

Two-thirds of the present class is working part or full time. The classes, four-six-hour sessions per day, begin at 8 a.m. in the morning and continue until 6 the next morning.

Men from 18 to 35 are eligible to attend. Selective service registrants in the course liable to be called are given special defense training deferment to allow them to complete their course.

Special hours can be arranged for those who show definite interest and are unable to attend full sessions.

Four Instructors Instructors in charge are W. O. Harvey, J. G. Albuschle, L. J. Pourtales and J. E. McCracken. In addition four instructors in related work teach the students: E. A. Conant, Dean Wentworth, Fred Goodwin, and Howard Null.

No charge is made for the course. It is open to all interested; residence in Eugene or Lane county is required.

The quality of instruction, vocational school officials aver, is top rank. Indicative of this is the fact that four graduates of the course are now serving as junior instructors in aviation work at the Sand Point naval training base near Seattle.

Nazi Panzers Said Halted Near Ukraine

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corps and said that "trophies," documents on military operations and prisoners were taken and nazi tank units hurried back.

Schmidt Captured London identified the commander of the 39th panzer corps as Gen. Rudolf Schmidt and reported that he had led the first armored division in the German attack on Poland in the French campaign.

London said, Schmidt commanded the 39th corps which pounded through the Sedan gap and created the bulge which led to the nazi break-through. Later he swung his forces north in a vain attempt to trap the British expeditionary force.

The British regarded Schmidt as one of the ablest armored commanders in the nazi panzer force but it still was not known whether he was the general referred to as having been killed in the Russian attack.

No Gains Claimed The German-Rumanian communique claimed that the axis force in this sector was "fulfilling its mission" but made no claims of any gains whatsoever on land. Sweeping claims of destruction of 130 Russian planes with the loss of only three German warcraft were balanced by admission that the Red air fleet had carried out wide bombings in Rumania, particularly on Constanza, and, apparently, the oil regions.

There was no hint as to where the soviet parachutists were dropped, but Ankara heard rumors two days ago that 2,000 Russian chutists had been dropped in the Plesli oil regions and Russian communiques had reported heavy air attacks on that area.

Cane Fruit Men to See Experiments in Hybrid Seedlings

Annual cane fruit day at the central experiment station at Oregon State college has been set for Tuesday, July 1, when literally thousands of new hybrid seedlings of red raspberries, blackcaps, blackberries, and crosses resembling loganberries and youngberries may be seen. In addition, entomologists, plant pathologists and horticulturists of the experiment station will be on hand to answer questions on disease and pest control and cultural practices, according to O. S. Fletcher, county agent.

The largest collection of selected seedlings of trailing blackberry types in this country may be seen now on the station, as the result of the cooperative breeding program carried on by George Waldo of the United States bureau of plant industry and the state experiment station.
