Senate Votes Funds To Protect Forests

WASHINGTON, July 1.—(AP)—To guard against "the increasing possibility of acts of incendiary sabotage," the senate voted \$1,100,000 today for emergency protection against forest fires, principally in California, Oregon and Washington.

E. W. Loveridge, assistant chief of the forest service, said all but \$100,000 of the sum would be expended in those three states to employ more fire guards, more look-out men and for "standby suppressing squads."

The \$1,100,000 item was included in a \$1,000,000,000 deficiency appropriation bill after the senate's appropriations committee had heard Loveridge testify that with the fire season just opening "something urgently needs to be done" to prevent forest fire damage to military establishments, defense industries and communication and power facilities.
