

Plane Makers Pool Resources

LOS ANGELES, July 1.—(AP)—American airplane builders are pooling their productive resources to give the United States and Britain an unprecedented fleet of long-range, four engine heavy bombers. The aviation news committee of the Aeronautical Chamber of Commerce of America reported today this cooperation would produce an estimated 500 bombers monthly in 1942. It based its figures on government records and forecasts. Three Pacific coast manufacturers—Boeing of Seattle, Douglas of Santa Monica, Calif., and Vega of Burbank, Calif.—have agreed upon a cooperative program for production of Boeing's B-17E bombers. Each will produce completely assembled warplanes. Parts will be interchangeable.

Hearing For Wilcox To Be Wednesday

WASHINGTON, July 1.—(AP)—The Senate judiciary committee approved unanimously Monday the nomination of Attorney General Robert H. Jackson to be an associate justice of the supreme court. The committee acted after Senator Tydings (D-Md.) had testified that the attorney general was unfitted for service on the court by character, philosophy and judicial temperament.

Russia Makes Bid For U. S. Materials

WASHINGTON, July 1.—(AP)—Sumner Welles, acting secretary of state, disclosed today that Russia had made its first overtures toward getting supplies from the United States. Welles said Constantine Oumansky, Soviet ambassador, had conferred yesterday with him on the placing of orders for materials for Soviet Russia to defend against German invasion. The Russian request, Welles added, had been forwarded to the other governmental departments interested. Welles declined to give any details concerning the materials wanted, explaining that would not be possible since Soviet Russia was a belligerent.

SALEM, July 1.—(AP)—State Senator L. W. Wiperman of Grants Pass thinks that sportsmen can deal with any enemy parachutists that might land on Oregon soil.

Origination Of "Cop" Title Told By History

CHICAGO, July 1.—(AP)—The slang word, "copper," used to signify police officer, had its origin, according to A. T. Andreas, historian, in the Chicago of 1838, when John C. Haines, known as "Copper-stock" Haines, was mayor.

Andreas, in his "History of Chicago," writes that "under Mayor Haines, a uniform for the police was adopted. It consisted of a short blue frock-coat which got the nickname of the 'copper-stock coat.' A plain brass star took the place of the leather medal worn by officers, according to Andreas.

The Chicago Tribune, on April 23, 1893, wrote, "Three coppers constituted Chicago's police force until 1848."

Lloyd Lewis, drama and sports editor of the Chicago Daily News, explains in his book, "Chicago: The History of Its Reputation," that Haines got the nickname because of his spectacular plunges in copper stock. The uniform was first called the "copper-stock coat" and the officers were later called "coppers."

Marshfield Seeks Parking Meter Vote

MARSHFIELD, Ore., July 1.—(AP)—Marshfield today considered amending its special election laws to allow an immediate referendum on the question of parking meters.

The city council recently passed an ordinance providing for installation of the meters on downtown streets, but met many objections from residents and merchants.

Under the present city law, the referendum could not be held for some time.

Huge Eagles Imitate Giant Stuka Bombers

MUIR, Mich., July 1.—(AP)—Grand Trunk trainmen who pass through this town daily have a rough idea of a Stuka dive bomber. Every time the train comes through a pair of American eagles poised over the cars and rocket down, sometimes to within 10 feet of the train crew.

The birds, who concentrate their attack on the engine, follow the train for approximately a mile and then return to their nest, which is near the right-of-way.

Membership stations for the "Keep Oregon Green" association have been set up at the offices of both Eugene newspapers and at the AAA office in the chamber of commerce headquarters, Eugene McNulty, field representative of the association announced Tuesday.

Mr. McNulty was in Eugene conferring with H. J. Cox, executive secretary of the Willamette Valley Lumbermen's association, on the campaign.

Available for showing is the West Coast Lumbermen's association technicolor movie, "Trees and Men."

This is official "Keep Oregon Green" week, as proclaimed by Governor Sprague. Purposes of the campaign, being financed largely by lumbermen and banking institutions in the state, is to reduce the number of man-caused forest fires through a program of publicity and education of the public.

New Trial Ordered By Supreme Court

SALEM, July 1.—(AP)—The state supreme court ordered a new trial today in the libel suit of Ralph DeLashmitt, Portland florist, against the Journal Publishing company. DeLashmitt was awarded \$5,050 damages in the court of Circuit Judge Robert Tucker of Multnomah county.

DeLashmitt caused the arrest of a peeping tom, but in the article about it on Dec. 3, 1938, the Oregon Journal erroneously identified DeLashmitt as the peeper.

The case had been argued three times before the supreme court. The high court decision, by Justice Rossman, held that DeLashmitt could not claim damages to his business because the Journal article never mentioned his business.

"On account of the circuit court's refusal to instruct the jury that purported business losses were not recoverable, the judgment is reversed," the decision said.

Chief Justice Kelly and Justice Bailey dissented.

The pieces in her collection are priced at from \$3 to \$1,000 and she has traveled all over the world buying them from all classes of

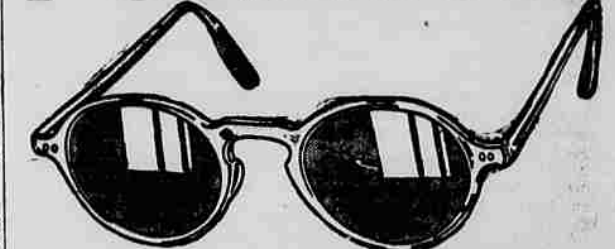
