NOW, CLAUDIUS, YOU DON'T MEAN IT!

Your attention, dear reader, is directed to the reprint from The Corvallis Gazette-Times under the heading "UNIVERSITY RECRUITING". (See below). This is an extremely interesting effusion, particularly that last sentence or two in which our pal Claudius Ingalls asks (himself):

"If individual institutions can use alumni funds or voluntary contributions to beat the Board's rulings and evade the state law, we are plainly on the way back to the old rivalries, the old feuds. The next question the taxpayers will be asking is Why a Chancellor? Why a central administration of any kind?"

Now frankly, we have no illusions about the System of Higher Education. Nor can we believe that the once virile Claudius has become such a sap as to suppose that with the creation of the System the lamented "feuds and rivalries" ever stopped.

If we wanted to be nasty (which we don't) we could show proof that for every recruiting device which the University has devised the Oregon State College has devised a couple of dingers to match. Nor have all curricular "duplications" been eliminated; in fact many have been restored, and perhaps more should be on both sides of the fence.

We could not be accused, ever, of being subservient admirers of either Board or Chancellor. Time and again we have lamented that the only education phrase which they seem to understand is:

"SHUSH!"

Nevertheless we are prone to credit Board and Chancellor with the slow and painful discovery of certain great educational truths:

1. Around Universities and State Colleges there grow LOYALTIES which neither laws nor regulations can suppress, and hence the impossibility of transferring to an impersonal "system" the love of either alumni or students.

2. The great evil of duplication is not in the existence of parallel courses; the only real or costly duplication is duplication of PURPOSE.

May we illustrate? Oregon cannot afford and does not need TWO universities or TWO state colleges. It could easily afford a State College which aimed to be as great as Purdue or MIT in the technical fields and a University which aimed to be as strong as California or Wisconsin.

It does Oregon little credit to have a University deprived of its normal functions in pure science, and in the efforts to restore pure science to the University campus there have never been any move to take a single science course away from the College. On the contrary we would be the first to say that all the practical sciences at Corvallis should be strengthened because in this age of aviation, the State College is impoverished in this department. Why? Because good state money is wasted trying to keep pace with the University in journalism and other departments.

There is much that we could criticize in the plus ten years of "unified higher education" which we have endeavored to endure for the sake of experiment. We are compelled to admit that probably much more good than evil has been accomplished. And although we had no part in bringing on this change we can't help wondering, Claudius, at your sudden discontent:

Is this wave of reaction against the System and the Chancellor due to the discovery that you can't run it?

WHAT OTHER EDITORS THINK

UNIVERSITY RECRUITING
(Corvallis Gazette-Times)

A friend in Eugene (Think we do not have a friend in Eugene?) has sent us a copy each of two faculty recruiting books put out by the university and they are pippins. They remind us of the time before such a thing had been declared "illegal" by the Board of Higher Education and the college and the university used to vie with one another to see which could get out the most appealing advertising. Now the State System of Higher Education seems rapidly on the way back to the status of competing universities, with all the attendant waste of student recruiting, institutional boosting, and snobbish extravagance. Open violations of the law of 1929 and of the published Code of the Board apparently go unrebuked, and flagrant attacks are directed at the Board and its executive officers in publications officially sponsored by organized groups of alumni who resort to falsehood and insult in an effort to stir up strife and gain their selfish ends.

The Survey Report contemplated a "University

of the State of Oregon with units... located at Ashland, Corvallis, Eugene, La Grande, Monmouth, and Portland" — a university "with six campuses." In June, however, the Medical School, following a petty campaign to rob the State College of its degree-granting powers as the seat of major curricula in science, announced its independence and joined its machinery to that of the University in efforts to break down the unified program.

In addition to going back to the old organization uniting the University and the Medical School in a closer combination against the State College, the University has recently been given Secretarial Science as a major coordinate with that at the State College. Thus return to duplication of major curricula is taking us back to the old order.

Now various publications have appeared that are frankly student recruiting booklets. They have the aspect of being official institutional circulars. They are clearly "advertising and publicity" on behalf of higher education, and belong to that class of publications that the law of 1929 ruled "shall emanate from and bear the name of the department of higher education." Yet they ignore entirely the unified system. They make no reference whatever to the State Board of Higher Education, the Chancellor, or the Division of Information. They present one institution as if it were the one and only. Yet they make offensive comparisons with other institutions in the State, both public and private. The limitations of the curricula are obscured by a smoke screen of boasting that leaves the impression that there is nothing else of value aside from the courses named.

This type of student recruiting that has gone on for approximately two years is now being supplemented by an "Oregon federation program" that sets up offices in the Oregon building in Portland and directs a score of student recruiters of the University of Oregon in a project of promoting the university among high school students.

Who is responsible for all this reactionary weakening of the unified organization of higher education? The Chancellor's office? In his biennial report for 1937-38 he put himself clearly on record by saying that "in the main the present structure and policy are to be maintained" and added that "the mistakes of the past cannot be corrected by attempting to move backward to reestablish old institutional structures and practices." He said also that "the institutions should proceed without public controversies... reverting to duplication, such as creating two universities..." Yet this is plainly the end of the underground group pressures that are shoving the Chancellor's office and the board right up to the edge of the pit of public controversy.

All this recalls the hectic campaigns of 1927 to 1929 when the university was scrambling to equal the enrollment at the State College. Naturally, it revives the anxieties of the real friends of higher education, who remember the spirit of weariness and indignation that seized the legislature of 1929, which resolved to put an end to individual rivalry by creating the unified system. But if individual institutions can use alumni funds or voluntary contributions to beat the Board's rulings and evade the state law, we are plainly on the way back to the old rivalries, the old feuds. The next question the taxpayers will be asking is Why a Chancellor? Why a central administration of any kind?

WASHINGTON LETTER

 WASHINGTON, D. C., July 5.—Not discouraged by the rebuff administered the navy by the senate committee on naval affairs, the brass hats of the army are endeavoring to convince congress that a national emergency should be declared. What this means is that the army would then hold all selective service trainees and all national guardsmen now mobilized indefinitely—as long as there is a threat to the nation.

Under a declared national emergency President Roosevelt could send the army to Siberia, Africa, England or any other place in the eastern hemisphere. The admirals asked permission to retain all the navy personnel regardless of the term of enlistment. The senate committee on naval affairs promptly refused to sanction this and informed the admirals that retaining the men beyond their enlistment would be a breach of contract; that it would not be fair to the men and would break down morale. Reason the admirals wished to keep every sailor is that the navy is rapidly expanding and personnel is not supplied from selective service.

Within the ranks of the army there is a churning and upheaval. It is at least purging itself of inefficient officers, hundreds of them, and has sent word to selective service boards to rake over their lists and defer all married men or those who have dependents. It sums up that the army is to be in charge of officers who are young and know their business and are physically fit; and, finally, that the army wants authority to use the troops anywhere without restraint.

Hundreds of officers have been sifted out during present maneuvers and others will be given the air during the great maneuvers in August and September. The age-old practice of seniority is being tossed aside and capable, smart young officers are being promoted. The high command is anxious to get rid of soldiers with dependents who have been too many complaints, and while the army cannot change the law a request to local boards to reclassify all with dependents will solve that question. Local boards reflect local opinion and many boards have been harried by men who have married to evade military training, but this action has been one of the principal causes of trouble in the army.

There are 575,000,000 feet of ponderosa pine in the upper Deschutes valley which, by Senator McNary would acquire for the Deschutes national forest. The bill (it has the approval of the forest service and the department of agriculture) authorizes an appropriation of \$445,000, but the estimated value is \$1,500,000. The land is privately owned and it is the hope of McNary that the timber will not be destroyed. The forest service and the Brooks-Seaton Lumber Co. are endeavoring to work out a deal for the permanent forest economy. The 575,000,000 feet are necessary to the plan, for the forest service reports that unless the land is acquired it will be subject to premature exploitation, financially profitable but socially uneconomic. Having conducted a special survey, the department of agriculture reports that the crops of youngberries, longanberries and blackberries are smaller this season than last. It was intended to buy up surplus berries and have them prepared for the market. The investigation disclosed, however, that there is an immediate market for the berries at good prices.

There is a prospect of aviation lines serving the Pacific northwest reducing their schedules. The government is taking the airlines and sending them to the British. Eighteen have already gone, 12 must be turned over this week and 12 more by August 1. Thirty more commercial passenger planes will soon be finished, will also go to the British and orders for 43 more have been surrendered to the government. While American lines have complied with the commandeering, they feel they have a kick coming when no Canadian line has, they assert, given up any planes and the British are maintaining their airlines in South America. Curtailment of schedules will, naturally, affect the airmail service.

Administration forces have prevented the publication of a report by a house subcommittee in which the high-ups are severely criticized for the handling of war materials and stockpiles. Contents of the report may be debated on the floor and reach the public in that manner.

The president has approved a WPA project for Oregon which would build fire trails and waterholes for stock in 18 counties—the western half of the state. Counties include Douglas, Josephine, Lane, Linn, Lincoln, Marion, Polk, Clatsop, Clackamas, Columbia, Cook, Curry, Tillamook, Washington, Yamhill and Multnomah.
