World Calendar
Official Due Here

Speaker for the weekly luncheon meeting of the Eugene Kiwanis club Monday noon at the Osburn hotel will be Rabbi Martin Weitz of Kenosha, Wis., member of the American advisory committee for the World Calendar Association, Inc.

"Has Father Time a Conscience?" will be the topic of Rabbi Weitz' talk. The adoption of the World calendar is a means to improve not only inter-American but also inter-world relations via a permanent calendar, toward a greater simplification and unification of world time-measurement. Rabbi Weitz contends. Under such a calendar, all holidays of fixed date would fall always on the same day of the week—a boon to teachers, school children and everybody else, he says.

Rabbi Weitz is spiritual leader to Wisconsin's second largest liberal congregation, Beth Hillel temple at Kenosha. He also is a member of the Kiwanis club there. He served Northwestern university as first director of the Hillel foundation for Jewish students at the institution and was director of education at Chicago's noted Temple Shalom. At one time he was special lecturer at Colorado

Deposits Increased
At U. S. National

The semi-annual financial statement of the United States National Bank, which maintains one of its prominent units in this city, shows as of June 30 another all-time high in deposits of \$177,090,911.27.
