energy which the Leaburg and Waverly plant can make. The municipal power plant expects to continue to deliver all available power during the next three or four months. Although local demands, increasing as fall approaches, will cut down the total that can be sent, approximately 8,000,000 kilowatt hours will probably be delivered by fall.

Bonneville does not pay for the energy immediately, since it is considered part of the 15,000,000 kilowatt hour "pool" of dump power. If the total should exceed that amount, the city power system would be paid at the rate of 3/4 cent per kilowatt hour.

The 2,500,000 kilowatt hours already in the pool are available for Eugene to draw against. They represent a value of more than \$6,000.

Although the balance is far in favor of Eugene, the city system has used Bonneville power to a greater or lesser degree each month since December, 1940. The month-by-month use of energy has been: December 136,580 kilowatt hours; January, 83,000; February, 17,000; March, 1,000; April, 7,000; May, 36,000; and June, 12,000.

This service has cost the water board approximately \$12,000. The major portion of the cost has been the "retainer fee" of 75 cents per kilowatt of demand, for 1,500 kilowatts of "prime power." This is under the special one-year contract which was negotiated last December, and which will expire December 6, 1941. Under it Bonneville guarantees to supply Eugene with 1,500 kilowatts of power on call. The availability of this "prime" power gives the municipal system added standby protection in case of emergency.

British Claim Bomb Raids Hinder Nazis

LONDON, July 7.—(AP)—British bombers pounded German-occupied France twice today in a continuation of an air offensive which a reliable observer said has jammed German communications on a deep arc from Brest to Kiel and softened German defenses along a thousand miles of the continental coast.

He credited the repeated attacks with:

1. Hampering German personnel and material movement, this also weakening the German drive into Russia;
2. Slowing production of German armament, oil and other war supplies;
3. Smashing facilities the Germans need to invade Britain;
4. Smoothing the way, if Britain sends an expeditionary force to the continent.

whether they would be supplemented by troops.

Mr. Roosevelt did not indicate, either, whether similar action might be taken against other possible stepping off points for a possible German attack on the western hemisphere.

Dangers Pointed Out

But he has spoken of dangers which might be inherent in any kind of control of such points as Dakar on the west coast of Africa and of the Cape Verde and Azores islands, which are Portuguese, and the Canary Islands, which are Spanish.

Along with his message to congress, Mr. Roosevelt sent to capitol hall the text of the letters exchanged between himself and the prime minister of Iceland.

Mr. Roosevelt received a letter from the prime minister on July 1 and replied the same day.

It was in line with an understanding reached in this exchange that the navy went into Iceland. While the president has hesitated to draw a definite boundary line for the western hemisphere, some administration officials have said that Iceland was outside of the western hemisphere. The line demarcation, as these sources outlined it, passed between Greenland and Iceland.

British Free For War

Now the United States for the first time has taken over the actual protective duties heretofore carried out by British troops. This will free the British for service elsewhere.

Mr. Roosevelt declared it to be "imperative that the approaches between the Americas" and the strategic outpost in the Atlantic should remain open and free from all hostile activity or threats.

The president said he consequently "issued orders to the navy that all necessary steps be taken to insure the safety of communications in the approaches between Iceland and the United States as well as on the seas between the United States and all other strategic outposts."

"This government," Mr. Roosevelt declared, "will insure the adequate defense of Iceland with full recognition of the independence of Iceland as a sovereign state."

"In my message to the prime minister of Iceland I have given the people of Iceland the assurance that American forces sent there would in no way interfere with the internal and domestic affairs of that country, and that immediately upon the termination of the present international emergency all American forces will be at once withdrawn, leaving the people of Iceland and their government in full and sovereign control of their own territory."

Russia Declares Million Nazis Taken

nazi columns had "broken" the Stalin line—presumably in the Ukraine sector.

All "Buffer" Taken Claim

The official German news agency said nazi troops in two weeks' fighting had captured nearly all the territory Russia acquired since Sept. 1, 1939—including the western Ukraine, western White Russia, Bessarabia, Northern Bucovina, Lithuania and Latvia.

Altogether, the news agency said, the seized territory is larger than the Germany of the Treaty of Versailles or about 182,000 square miles.

A Moscow bulletin said Russian defenders had driven the Germans back in five key sectors of the 2,000-mile battle front.

The Soviet high command said Russian troops had seized the offensive in heavy fighting from the Baltic to the Black sea, smashing the Germans along the Berezina river and hurling back a nazi drive aimed at the north flank of the Stalin line.

DNB (official German news agency) asserted German troops had "broken" the line, which runs 75 miles deep in some places. No details were given.

Equally vague, the Berlin radio said German columns had pierced the line at several points.

Wooden Tanks?

The Russians reported officially that the Germans were using wooden-and-canvas tanks to pad out their paper columns, described as self-propelling and carrying machine guns.

Red Army scouts, it was said, discovered the subterfuge when they spotted a nazi tank column moving up to the front and noted with amazement that "the body of one of the tanks unexpectedly gave in under the pressure of the elbow of an officer who leaned against it."

In the column, the Russians said, only one of the 20 tanks was genuine.

The German high command said axis troops had captured Cernauti, capital of Sovietized Bucovina, in a drive toward the Russian Ukraine.

Rumanian and Hungarian troops, allies of Germany, were declared to have reached the upper Dneestr river in Bucovina, while in nearby Bessarabia, German-Rumanian forces were reported "in a progressive advance" after repulsing Soviet counterattacks.

Reds Claim Opposite

By contrast, a Red army bulletin said that in the Bessarabian sector "the enemy, suffering very

heavy losses, was thrown back to his previous position."

A Moscow communique, proclaiming success everywhere for the Red armies, declared heavy losses had blunted the German drive to the east, and that German attempts to cross the Dneestr river near Bobruisk, on the central front, had been repelled violently.

Describing bitter fighting along a river—apparently the Berezina—a Soviet communique declared the Germans threw fresh reserves into the battle and "crossed to our shore at a cost of tremendous sacrifices."

Counter-attacking with bayonets, Russian troops "threw the German fascists back across the river, inflicting heavy casualties," the communique said.

"The bodies of several thousand fascist soldiers remained on the field of battle, and many more perished in the river."

Penetration Not Deep

While conflicting versions of the 16-day-old struggle came from Moscow and Berlin, one thing seemed clear:

Adolf Hitler's invasion armies, according to reports edited by the nazi fuhrer himself, still were fighting mostly on the fringe of the vast Soviet hinterlands after battering through sovietized "buffer" states. A German military commentator admitted frankly the Russians remained at their posts longer than the French did in the 1940 campaign in the west.

On the reported break at Russia's main defense works, the Germans made this announcement:

"Near the fortification system of the Stalin line, German troops have started to attack the Bunker line after successfully defeating Soviet rearguard forces."

"Several strongly fortified bunkers were captured, and the Stalin line was pierced at several places. The German troops continue their advance."

"The bolshevik troops who have been dispersed in the sector of the Pripiet (Pinsk) marshes are hastily retreating toward the Stalin line. Only small units of these forces managed to reach sites of safe resistance, due to the advancing German troops and the heavy attacks of the Luftwaffe."

DNB (German news agency) said nazi columns were lunging ahead from the Volhynia region, west of Kiev, the Ukraine capital, and driving the Russians before them.

DNB said Red army soldiers attempted unsuccessfully to hold strongly-armed modern castles after Soviet rearguard units had been crushed.

On the far north front, the Germans said Finnish troops "succeeded in encircling a whole Soviet battalion after half of them had been killed in action."

Carnegie Institution Head To Dig in John Day Fossil Beds

Bound for the John Day region in central Oregon, where for more than 40 years he has been keenly interested in what he declares is one of the greatest areas for revelation of the story of life in the United States, Dr. John C. Merriam, president emeritus of the Carnegie Institution, will leave here Tuesday.

In company with Samuel H. Boardman, state parks superintendent, Dr. Merriam will spend some time inspecting present and prospective park sites in this region. Several places of unusual interest to laymen and scientists have already been set aside for this purpose.

Dr. Merriam plans to spend the entire summer in Oregon, and will make his headquarters at the University of Oregon and Oregon State college. As head of the Carnegie Institution for many years he has maintained a keen interest in the John Day fossil region, and has aided and encouraged several scientists in research of various phases found there.

It is the hope of Dr. Merriam that studies of various men, made during the past 40 years, and his own research findings, can be coordinated into a complete document on the John Day region, and that this may be made available in the near future.

The John Day region, for four important reasons, presents one of the most important areas in the world for actually tracing the story of life on earth, Dr. Merriam points out. He cites as points:

1. The "story" is pretty well filled in.
2. The story of life is mixed in with vulcanism.
3. The "book" has been opened up by erosion brought about by the John Day river.
4. The region is easily accessible.

Dr. Merriam plans to make observations and take photographs while on the present trip, and will make information he gathers available when he returns here in about two weeks.

WELLES EXPRESSES REGRET

WASHINGTON, July 7.—Acting Secretary of State Welles today said that his country was regretting the matter of profound regret the Americas and indicated opinion exists that the trouble fomented by outside sources.

Asked whether he believed some outside influence behind the outbreak, Welles called an old Spanish proverb: "Very often in muddy fishing is good."

He said he did not have client information to comment on that possibility.

He said that the incident was regrettable in view of the present critical international situation and in view of the recent offer of the services to both countries by Argentina, Brazil and the United States. He said the offer made in the hope of avoiding apparently has happened.

Other officials indicated the United States may begin negotiations at once with Argentina and Brazil in an effort to bring about a truce between the disputing nations.
