"Blitzkrieg" tactics in forest fire fighting were described to members of the junior chamber of commerce Tuesday at their regular luncheon in the Del Rey cafe by A. B. Everett, assistant supervisor of the Willamette national forest.

Use of airplanes to land parachute fire-fighters, and of special chutes which open close to the ground for the landing of supplies has been made by the forest service for several years.

The forester indicated that the practice antedated Hitler's use of such tactics in actual warfare.

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Nazi Forces Routed In Attempt To Cross Dnepr River

to fight against the U. S. S. R. Without giving details, the Germans reported that "pursuit of the enemy" was continuing on the road to Kiev, the capital of the Soviet Ukraine.

On the northern front, the Russians said terrific battles were raging, with Red troops fighting twin German drives from the north and southeast toward Leningrad, Russia's second biggest city.

Nazi reconnaissance pilots reported that aerial bombing by the Luftwaffe had paralyzed Soviet traffic on the 1200-mile railway line between Leningrad and the ice-free Arctic port of Murmansk. The line was "gapped by huge craters in many places," they said.

Moscow asserted that German mechanized columns lunging through the Ostrov area northeast toward Leningrad had been stemmed by fierce Soviet resistance.

The Red army communique said huge losses were inflicted on other invasion columns knifing into the U. S. S. R. in the Kakisalmi sector,

on the Karelian Isthmus north of Leningrad, and Kandalagsha, 150 miles from Murmansk.

A Finnish communique Finnish troops had penetrated Soviet territory at a number of points on the Karelian Isthmus with 400 Russians slain in a battle.

While Britons cheered the news of U. S. naval forces landing as making the Atlantic Anglo-American lake," commentators warned of a battle.

In Rome, a highly-placed official asserted that "President Roosevelt has assumed the grave responsibility of sending his ships to a blockade zone" and that "not to send American troops outside the continent."

In Tokyo, the Japanese paper Kokumin said the war was "de facto participation war." All Tokyo newspapers played the story under big lines.

Domel, the authoritative news agency, said that the United States had entered the zone of hostilities defined by Germany and held "increased possibilities" for further aggravation in the war between the United States and Germany.

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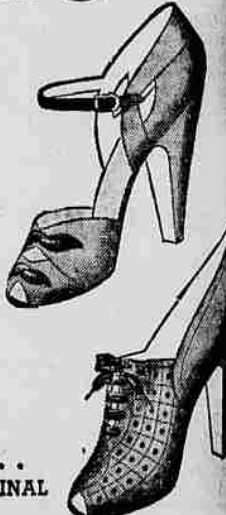
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
